Fruit and vegetables have suffered the to be generally up to the average and in some places far in excess. in accordance with the practices followed in Manitoba this year is the most blessed of all our provinces and will have, it is estimated, five million bushels of wheat for exportation compared with three million last

From the Western and Northwestern States the reports are of a very different character, a rough estimate of the losses by the dry weather being 17 per cent of the entire corn crop, representing in value about \$120,000,000. If the estimate is rightly understood the injury to the hay crop may be reckoned at \$80,000,000, but it is impossible to determine how considerable the losses will be through failure of food for animals and of the milk supply. The value John J. Reilly, employed in a stove foun- of meats consumed annually is roughly estiunderstood that serious losses in these important branches of production would fall heavily upon the farming community. Reckoning also a loss of one fifth in the yield of potatoes and fruit, 3 per cent. in cotton, and further losses in wheat and tobacco, it may be assumed that the drouth west and northwest will cost the farmers the enormous sum of \$260,000,000, or about 7 per cent. of their annual product, besides whatever losses they sustain in animal and dairy products. An advance in prices will compensate in a measure for this great loss, but it can never make up the whole.






