Directors' Meeting
Minutes of special meeting of the Rich-
mond Hill Mechanics' Institute Directors
held in the lecture room of the Masonic
Hall, on Tuesday evening, 6th inst.
Directors present: Messrs. I. Crosby
(President), P. G. Savage, G. Newbery,
D. Boyle, R. E. Law, T. F. McMahon,
W. A. Sanderson, W. Trench, F. Mc-
Conaghy and Dr. Wilson.
The minutes of last meeting were read,
and business arising out of said minutes
was attended to.
The following committees were then
struck:—
Re Union Committee, T. F. McMahon,
Dr. Wilson, W. A. Sanderson and the
Secretary; Debate and Lecture Com.,
D. Boyle, G. Newbery, and F. McCon-
aghy; Library Com., R. E. Law, Dr.
Wilson and W. Trench; Finance Com.,
P. G. Savage and W. Trench.
R. E. Law was appointed Librarian.
The Treasurer's books having been
audited, showed the receipts for last year
to be \$90 91; the expenditure \$67.84
leaving a balance of \$23.07.
Moved by R. E. Law, seconded by G.
Newbery, that the report of the auditor
be adopted.—Carried.
Moved by Mr. Savage, seconded by
Mr. Boyle, that the thanks of this meet-
ing be tendered to Mr. G. B. Smith, M.
P. P. for East York, for the large num-
ber of volumes of the Ontario Statutes
kindly presented to this Institute.—
Carried.
The question of establishing a Reading
Room in connection with the Institute
was then taken up, and discussed by the
Directors and Messrs. Switzer and Har-
rison, and Revs. Simpson and Rutledge.
Dr. Wilson, who had received a letter
from an officer of Stouffville Mechanics'
Institute, gave a statement as to the way
the Reading Room was conducted in that
village, and the expenses connected
with it. Rev. Mr. Rutledge gave a similar
account in reference to the village of West-
on. After the subject was fully discus-
ed, it was moved by Mr. Law, seconded
by Mr. Savage, that Messrs. Crosby,
Sanderson and Dr. Wilson be a commit-
tee to ascertain the probable cost of rent,
care-taking, fuel, light and other expenses
in connection with the proposed Reading
Room, and to report at the next meeting.
—Carried.
The meeting then adjourned to meet
at the call of the chair.

A. O. F.
At the Brantford meeting held in Aug-
ust, Mr. W. Williams, H. C. Secretary,
read the following report, which must
have been satisfactory to the officers and
members of the different A. O. F. Courts
throughout the Dominion.
**To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and
Delegates in High Court Meeting As-
sembled:**
**RESPECTED BRETHREN:—Herewith I
would respectfully present to you a State-
ment of the Order in Canada, for the year
1887 as follows:**
There are 76 Courts established, com-
prising 7350 members. The aggregate
amount of funds in the Courts' treasuries
and under their control amount to \$81,-
480.00. There were 27,363 days sickness
experienced during the year for which
was paid the sum of \$18,242.00. 33 mem-
bers died and 34 members' wives. This
amount does not include expenses of man-
agement.
**THE JUVENILE BRANCH.—The Juvenile
Branch has 18 Courts consisting of 1,020
members. The worth of their funds is
\$2,295.00. The amount paid out for
sickness during the year was \$900.00 and
payments for other purposes of \$1,105.00.
The amount received during the year was
\$2,465.00. Some Courts have libraries
in connection for the benefit of their
members.
**THE HIGH COURT.—The High Court
has 76 Courts under its jurisdiction in****

the Dominion of Canada. Its funds are
as follows:
**SICK AND FUNERAL FUND.—The re-
ceipts during the year for the Sick and
Funeral Fund, including balance at last
audit, were \$13,781.96. The expenditure
\$7,109.93, leaving a balance to the credit
of the fund of \$6,672.03 as follows:—To
credit of trustees in bank, \$4,091.94; in
hands of treasurer in bank, \$2,580.09.
There was expended from this fund the
sum of \$3,150.00 for deaths of members,
\$1,700.00 for deaths of members' wives,
and for extended sick pay the sum of
\$2,259.93.
In comparison with last year there was
an increase of receipts to this fund for
the year of \$2,011.05. An increase of
expenditure for members' deaths of \$300-
.00 and for extended sick pay the sum of
\$691.61; a total increase of expenditure
of \$991.61 from this fund.
**MANAGEMENT FUND.—The receipts for
the Management Fund, including balance
at last audit, were \$5,963.05. The ex-
penditure for management and goods pur-
chased was \$2,730.58, leaving a balance
in treasurer's hands of \$2,232.50.
In comparison with last year there was
an increase of receipts in the sum of \$22-
.47 and a decrease in expenditure of \$1-
.113 88.
There is an increase of Assets over
Liabilities of \$3,322.88 during the year.
The total worth of the High Court is
\$12,240.50.
All of which is respectfully submitted.
