YORK CO. W. C. T. UNION
CONVENTION.
Second Day' Proceedings.
(BY OUR OWN REPORTER.)

The earnest, business-like expression
so apparent on the countenances of the
hundred or more delegates assembled in
the Methodist Church Newmarket, has
so indelibly impressed itself upon my
mind that I feel it a pleasure to present
to the readers of THE LIBERAL the pro-
ceedings of that noble band of W. C. T.
U. workers of the city of Toronto and
County of York, at the second day's ses-
sion, which opened at 9.30 a. m. on
Friday, Sept. 30th, by devotional exer-
cises by Mrs. Sowerby, of Aurora; at the
same time the Executive Committee dis-
cussed a private branch of business in
the vestry. The Convention was called
to order at ten o'clock, the President,
Mrs. McFarlane, presiding. After the
Secretary's report had been read and
adopted, the reports of Superintendents
of Departments followed in quick suc-
cession, each presenting a very full and care-
fully prepared account, showing that
they had entered upon this great work in
the proper spirit to carry it to a success-
ful issue. Their distribution of Tracts
during the year numbered high up in the
thousands.

Reports went to show that fermented
wine, for church purposes, is on the de-
cline. Already forty-three churches in
the county are using the unfermented
juice of the grape at communion,—thirty-
one of these being in the city of Toronto.
I especially notice the Evangelistic Gael
Work Departments, which have been so
successfully worked, and other new fea-
tures recently introduced, such as Relief
and Flower Missions, which, in prisons
and rooms of affliction, imparted a good
influence, accompanied by Fern Messages.
In fact each department spoke encourage-
ment for that grand scheme so rapidly
progressing.

The amended constitution was then
read and offered for discussion. It was
finally, after a careful examination of
each clause, sent to the Executive of the
Provincial Union for ratification. Mrs.
F. S. Spence, Secretary of the District
Union, of Toronto, by request, read the
constitution adopted by that Union.

A call for the election of officers for the
ensuing year resulted as follows:—Presi-
dent, Mrs. Fawcett, North Toronto;
Vice-President, at large, Mrs. Smith,
Newmarket; Recording Secretary, Miss
Foster, North Toronto; Corresponding
Secretary, Mrs. (Dr.) Langstaff, Rich-
mond Hill; Treasurer, Mrs. H. Cane,
Newmarket. The Superintendents of
Departments remain unchanged.

Aurora extended an invitation for the
next meeting in March, which was ac-
cepted. The Question Drawer excited
great interest, and some lively discussion
was entered into.
In the absence of Miss Skinner, Miss
Alexander, of Toronto, took her place,
and gave an address on Young Woman's
Work, also an interesting lesson to the
children of the Newmarket Band of Hope,
illustrating her remarks by Dr. Kellogg's
chart.

The evening meeting was held in the
same church, Rev. Mr. Webber occupy-
ing the chair. He spoke very encourag-
ingly of the ladies of their work, and
congratulated them upon the success of
their Convention. Mrs. Keefer, of Tor-
onto, gave a Scientific Temperance Ad-
dress, illustrated by chart, which was
very interesting. Mrs. Wiley, of Rich-
mond Hill, gave a brilliant address, em-
bracing the various departments of work,
which was highly appreciated.

Before the convention was brought to
a close the visitors tendered a most hearty
vote of thanks to the Newmarket
ladies for the kind hospitality shown
them. The meeting closed with the dox-
ology and benediction.
