School Board Meeting.

The monthly meeting of the Richmond Hill School Board was held in the Coun cil Chamber on Monday, Nov. 7th, at.

Members present: Messrs. Brown (Chairman), Lynet, Savage, Glass, Wilson, McConaghy, Switzer, Duncan, Russell and Naughton.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A bill from the caretaker of the schools for brooms, glass, &c., amounting to \$133, and one from J. Heise, for work, amounting to \$3 75, were read and ordered to be paid.

The Secretary read the report of Mr. Seath, High School Inspector, on his visit of the 11th of October. It showed that the school is in a flourishing condition, and much better than most schools of two teachers. Organization and discipline good, and marks given for teaching excellent. He reported the outhouses as inadequate and in a most unsatisfactory condition, and recommended several changes. Some of the library books he spoke of as worthless.

The work of selecting an Assistant for the High School, from among the applications which had been sent to the Secretary, was then taken up. Fifteen candidates applied for the situation, but probably not more than one or two were qualified for the position, and very few had

much experience in High School work. Besides the fifteen applicants at \$500 salary, Mr. Innes applied at \$600.

After the applications and testimonials had been carefully read and discussed, it was moved by Mr Duncan, seconded by Dr. Wilson, that in case Mr. Anderson, a gentleman from Seaforth, be able to qualify, the position be offered him.

Mr. McConaghy moved in amendment that Mr. Innes be offered the position at a salary of \$550.

Several of the members objected to Mr. Innes'application being considered, is they had advertised at \$500, and thought it would be unfair to other teachers.

The original motion was then put and carried, and Mr. Switzer was instructed to telegraph to Mr. Anderson and ascer-

tain if he had a professional certificate. Mr. Naughton, seconded by Mr. Russell, had previously moved that the Secretary be instructed to advertise for an Assistant at a salary of \$600, and this was embodied in the original motion.

Mr, Savage suggested that Mr. Lent be offered the position at his present sal-

Re-engaging teachers for the Public School was then taken up. It was decided at the last meeting that only three teachers would be required for the coming year.

Mr. Switzer moved, seconded by Mr. Lynet, that the teachers in the three present salaries.

Mr. McConaghy moved in amendment that Miss McLaughlin, of the 4th division, be re-engaged in place of Miss Rutherford, of the 2nd division, on the ground that the parents of the former paid village taxes, and that Miss Mc-Laughlin boarded in the village.

Mr. Naughton moved that a male teacher be engaged for the 1st division. Neither of the last two having a seconded, the original motion was put and carried, and the meeting adjourned.
