

THE WEEK'S NEWS.

CANADIAN.

The steam barge Chamberlain, of Windsor, has been fined fifty dollars for violation of the Steamboat Inspection Act.

Anthrax coal dust has been placed on the tree list. Bituminous coal and dust, however, are still liable to duty.

More than two hundred thousand dollars of the additional endowment for Queen's University has already been raised.

During the past season 5,800,000 bushels of grain have been transhipped at Kingston to Montreal, 500,000 bushels less than last year.

It is generally believed that the Manitoba experimental farm will be located at Little Stony Mountain or some other place in the vicinity of Winnipeg.

It is generally believed in Montreal that the negotiations in New York for the new Quebec loan of three and a half million dollars have entirely collapsed.

In sinking the test wells for the water supply of St. Thomas a vein was struck thirty-five feet below the surface which will yield fifty thousand gallons a day.

Judge Robertson, of the Chancery Divisional Court, has made an order for the winding up of the Central Bank, of Toronto and appointing a provisional liquidator.

Fire in the insane asylum at London destroyed the laundry, kitchen, drying-room and bakery, causing a loss of from \$25,000 to \$50,000. None of the patients were injured.

Much indignation is expressed in Montreal at the delay of the contractor in completing the flood dyke, which, it is feared, will not be finished in time to prevent another serious loss.

English emigration returns for the past eleven months show an increase to Canada of over fourteen thousand and to the States of over fifty-seven thousand, and a total increase of emigration of 64,940.

Miss Maria Collins, of Collingwood, will be presented by the Marine Department with a beautiful gold locket for her heroic rescue of two persons from drowning in the Georgian Bay last August, during a sudden storm.

During the past season over one hundred million of whitefish ova have been secured by the Fisheries Department, more than double the quantity ever secured in any previous season. The close season for whitefish and salmon trout ended on Dec. 1.

An exciting encounter between students of Queen's University and the Kingston police occurred on Saturday night, one of the students being arrested for singing in the streets, his companions being prevented from rescuing him by the constable's threat to use his revolver if interfered with.

A deputation of grain men had an interview with Mr. VanHorne relative to the work of the contemplated grain and produce exchange. The question of wheat grading was also considered, and the general manager expressed himself favourably to a modification of the present Manitoba grades.

Lieut-Governor Dewdney and Mr. Hayter Reed have arrived at Winnipeg for the purpose of enquiring into the complaints made by the St. Peter's Indians. Both these gentlemen say that affairs in the North-West were never more satisfactory than at present. The Indians are quiet and the police force was never more efficient.

A general court of the Hudson Bay Company was held in London this week at which Governor Colville reported that there was a bright prospect ahead for the company. All their vessels had arrived safely with increased stock, but it was impossible to say what the result would be. Furs were bought at low prices, and would no doubt be sold at a fair profit. He also stated that the Dominion Government had behaved fairly and liberally in recompensing the losses sustained by the company in the North-West rebellion of 1885.

UNITED STATES.

From October 3rd to December 3rd the enormous sum of \$26,703,269 was received for taxes in the city of New York.

The new cancer hospital, on 8th avenue, New York, has been formally opened. It is the first of the kind established in this country.

Resolutions favouring Commercial Union with Canada and an early and equitable adjustment of the fisheries question have been adopted by the New York Chamber of Commerce.

Fire in Cincinnati last week completely destroyed the great building of the Strobidge Lithographing Company, with all its valuable contents, causing a loss of about \$300,000.

The experiment of heating railway cars by steam from the engine has proved so successful on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road that the system has been permanently adopted.

The Sultan of Turkey has conferred the decoration of the Commander of the Medjidie on Dr. Morris H. Henry, of New York, for distinguished contributions to medical surgical science.

A special committee of the American Philological Society have reported against the universal language "Volapuk" as unsuited to the needs of modern thought and a distinct retrogression in linguistic progress.

During a recent heavy gale on the north east coast of Cuba the sea invaded a portion of the city of Baracoa, destroying about 140 houses. The loss of the steamer Gumeery and an American schooner is also reported.

FOREIGN.

After several ballots M. Sardi-Carnot has been elected President of France, to succeed M. Grevy.

Prince Bismarck intends to resign in January the post of Landrath of Naugard, which he has held since 1841.

It is stated that the Pope desires to act as a peacemaker and eventually as mediator between England and Ireland.

A severe shock of earthquake, unattended with serious damage, was experienced in Chorley, Lancashire, last week.

At a meeting of the Dublin Corporation Mr. Sexton was unanimously elected Lord Mayor to succeed Mr. Sullivan.

Mr. Sheehy, M. P., who has been evading a warrant for some time, has been arrested and is now in Sligo prison.

There is a renewal in Berlin of the rumours that Russia is concentrating a military force along the Austrian frontier.

The Irish police are actively endeavoring to arrest Mr. Gilhooly, M. P. for Cork, who has taken refuge with Mr. Pyne in Lisfenny castle.

Mr. Graham, M. P., and Mr. Burns, the Socialist leader, who were arrested during the Trafalgar square riots, have been committed for trial.

Mr. Dillon has been receiving a warm welcome from the Liberals of England, and it is believed he will come back to Parliament a very strong rival to Mr. Parnell.

A new vendor at Killarney has been sentenced to a month's imprisonment for selling copies of United Ireland containing reports of meetings of suppressed branches of the League.

All the members of the Austrian Reichsrath who are school teachers have been ordered to give up their school duties for the session, on the ground that education and politics should be kept separate.

The Queen has carried off six first prizes, one second, one third, and two silver cups at the Smithfield cattle show. The Prince of Wales only secured one second-class prize although he competed in nine classes.

At the Unionist banquet given in Dublin recently, Mr. Kenny, an eminent Catholic barrister, denounced Home Rule as an insidious misnomer, simply meaning the dismemberment of the Empire and the utter ruin of Ireland.

The second trial of Lord Mayor Sullivan, for printing in his paper reports of suppressed branches of the National League, resulted in a conviction, and Mr. Sullivan was sentenced to two months' imprisonment without hard labor.

Lord Charles Bessford told his constituents last week that ten reforms had already been accomplished by the Admiralty, the result being to enormously strengthen the navy, a great saving of expenditure and better protection for the mercantile marine.

A cablegram says the Socialist meetings in London passed off quietly. The only incident was the chaining of a man to the railings in Trafalgar square to assert the right of free speech, and while the police were working at the padlocks the man, who was subsequently arrested, harangued the crowds.

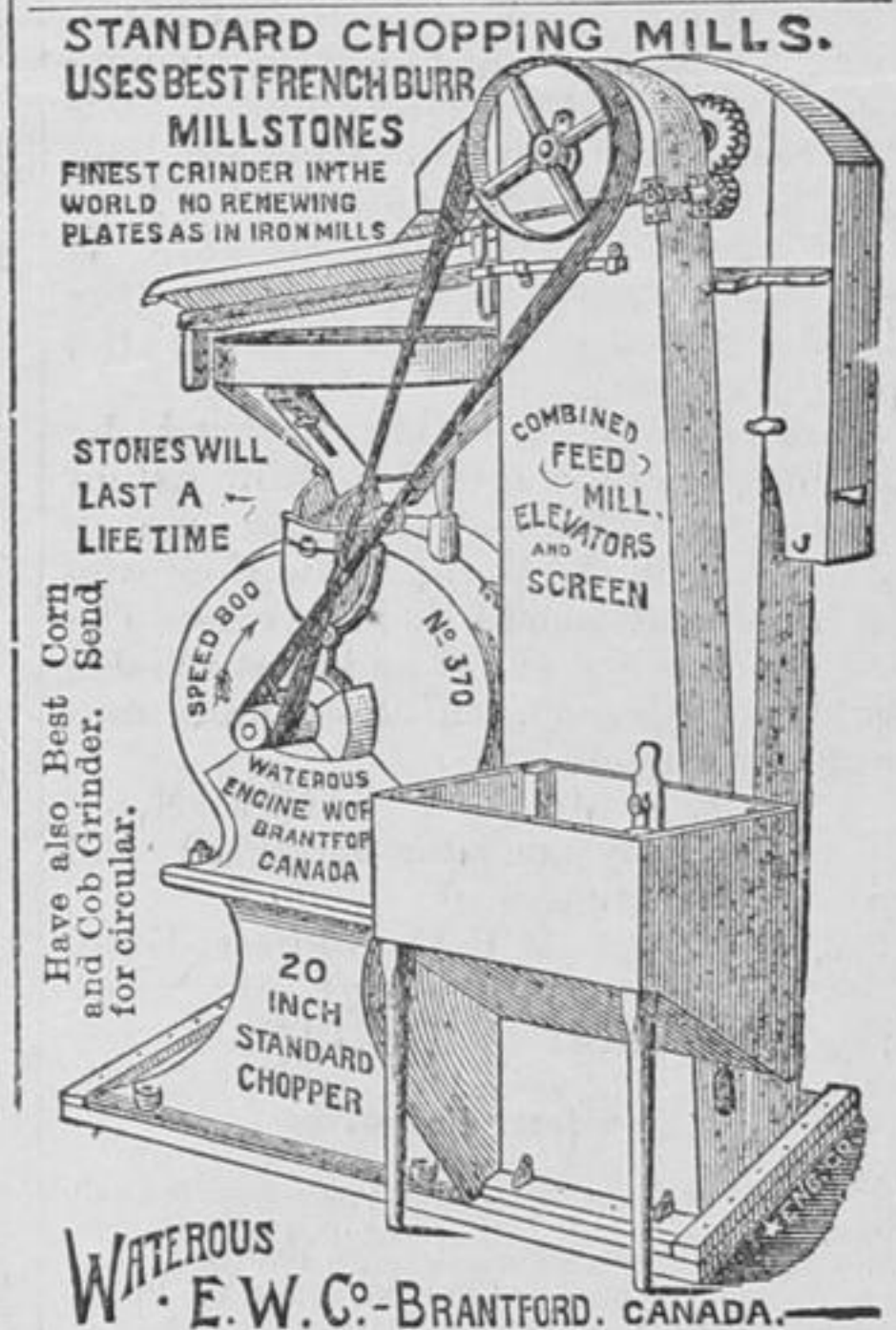
