LOYALTY VS. DISLOYALTY.

The Tories are never tired of accusing the Liberals of disloyalty. If a Liberal objects to pay more for granulated sugar than is paid in any other country, he is disloyal. If a Liberal says that he should be permitted to deal in the market most favorable to his business, he is disloyal. If a Liberal declares that a people have some rights on which even a railroad should not be allowed to trample, he is disloyal. If finally a Manitoba Liberal, to escape the grinding monopoly that is fast choking the life out of the Prairie Province, hies himself into Dakota, he is disloyal. So say the Tories; it must be so for they know. Will the Tories be good enough to properly brand Mr. Hamilton, Attorney-General in the late Norquay Administration? Mr. Hamilton, the very moment that his salary ceased as a member of the Manitoba Cabinet, departed at once to Minnesota, took the oath of allegiance to Uncle Sam, and thus renounced in an especial manner his allegiance to Queen Victoria. What sort of man is Mr. Hamilton? Disloyal? Perish the thought. A Tory is never disloyal, even when he is sucking the very life-blood of his country. Only Liberals are ever disloyal. Mr. Hamilton is a Tory, therefore, a gentleman, therefore above all reproach, and therefore loyal to the throne, that is, to himself.

OUR HIGH SCHOOLS.

The Newmarket Era takes, in no spirit of jealousy, strong grounds against the County Council's late action anent our High Schools. Among other things the Era calls attention to the fact that at present Aurora sends just seven pupils to the Newmarket High School. This does not go to prove that Aurora is painfully pining for higher education. To set this in a stronger light, we may add that the little village of Maple contributes to Richmond Hill High School eight pupils. Why should not Maple also have a High School of its own? When the rate-payers realize the full significance of the proposed increase in the number of our County High Schools, and the proposed reduction of the County grant to those that are now in existence, that have been established at a great expense, and that are now threatened with serious calamity, we are inclined to think that they will insist on a sharp understanding with those who favored the change. It is not yet, indeed, too late to retreat, and we venture to express the opinion that retreat, at least in the matter of the reduction, will be the safest course for the innovators to pursue.

THE LOCAL ASSEMBLY.

After three weeks of preparation, the Budget Speech of Treasurer Ross may be regarded as the real beginning of business in the Local House. The estimates are slightly in excess of those of last year, but the rare prudence and economy of the government still enable them to provide for all the expenses of the Province without encroaching on the Capital Assets. That our affairs are wonderfully well administered is proved beyond doubt by the failure of the Opposition to maintain even the semblance of a debate on Treasurer Ross' motion for Mr. Speaker to leave the chair. Mr. H. E. Clarke, one of the members for Toronto, did indeed indulge in a feeble attempt to create an impression that all is not as it should be. But Mr. G. B. Smith, East York's

representative, in a speech replete with good humor and wide commercial knowledge, effectively squelched the eminent trunk-maker. It is said that the Opposition will make themselves heard when the House is in committee of supply. Perhaps, but it must be confessed that no task is more discouraging than looking for a hole that exists only in the mind of the searcher.
