The only business brought before the chair was finally auditing the accounts of Treasurer Wilson. The books and vouchers showed the receipts for the Public School during the past year to have been \$2445.27 including loans yet unpaid to the amount of \$400; Expenditure \$2100 93, leaving a balance of \$344.34 in the treasurers hands. In the High School the receipts were \$2096.09, expenditure \$2279,81 making a deficil of \$183.72.

Village Council.

The Council held its regular meeting on Monday evening, April 9th, Members present Messrs. Pugsley, (Reeve) Sandersa .. Savage, Atkinson and Dr. Wilson, Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The following accounts were read, all for shoveding snow: W. A. Suider, \$1.35, John Empringham, \$2.60, Chas. Smel-or, \$1.50, Aduer Reid, 75 cts., J. Piper, \$1.50. Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by W. Sauderson that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the foregoing accounts .- Carited. After a discussion on the water question the following resolutions were carried: Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by W. Sanderson that the Council do proceed to procure a better supply of water for village and all other necessary purposes as approved at a public meeting of rate-payers on the 28th of March. Moved by Dr. Wilson, seconded by W. Atkinson that a committee of the whole Council are hereby appointed to confer with Mr. Wm. Trench and prepare a preliminary draft of an agreement in relation to the sinking of a well, and any other necessary arrangements in connection therewith, and to report at the next meeting of the Council. The council adjourned to meet at the call of the chair.

Temperance Rivival Meetings. The Revival Gospel Temperance Meetings held in the Temperance Hall under the auspices of the Royal Templars of Temperance came to a close last Friday evening. The wind up was an excellent concert, the programme comprising many new Hymns and Songs and, by request, many favorites given on previous evenings by Messrs. Dunnett and Stafford, the R scue Duet. There were also Solos and Quartettes by local talent and an excellent audress by the Rev. Mr. Rutledge, who utilized the recent 'third party' movement as the basis of his remarks. A hearty Men's Gibraltar serge overcouts \$4 and successful efforts of the young men to revive the old-time enthusiasm of the rank and file of the temperance people of Richmond Hill was unamimously passed, to which Mr. Dunnett feelingly replied. We think that these special temperance meetings have been promotive of much good. Tue sluging of the Rescue Duet was very attrictive and arew crowded houses; the stirring addresses of Mr. Dunnett and the Revs. Messis. Simpson, Percevil, and Rutledge have helped to educate our people up to a uigher sense of their responsibilities as christian temperance workers; the Council of Royal Templars have largely increased their number, and a week of pleasant and profitable evenings have been enjoyed by a large portion of our village, the expenses of which have been more than met by a generous public. The membership during the wie increased from 26 to 92.

Vaughan Council.

Vaughan Council met in the Town Hall last Tuesday, the 10th inst. In the forenoon the regular business, such as passing bills, &c., was disposed of, after which, at 12 o'clock, noon, an adjournment was mad, when the members, Clerk, reporter and a funeral of Mrs. Dinnee, an elderly lady, who I tew other favored ones, partook of a good dinner prepared by Mrs. J. J. Cameron. whose residence is quite close to the place of meeting. Notwithstanding a heavy down pour of rain there was quite a large attendance at the afternoon se-sion, as it was understood that business out of the ordinary line would be taken up. The letal fraternit, was represented in the persons of Messrs. Murray, of Brampton, and Smoke, of Toronto. The former gentleman appeared on behalf of a Mrs. Dick, as the council had given notice that they purposed passing a By-Law authorizing the opening up of a certain road on the 10th concession. This Mr. Dick onjected to on the ground that the land wurch the Council intended taking for the road was her property on which she contemplated erecting a grist mill. The By-Law pa sed. Next came the By-Law to close up, in compliance with a petition signed by Mr. Geo. Elliott and 78 others, what is known as The Shaver Road in the 8th concession. Tois was first a trespass road, afterwards a rented road, and still later an established road, according to a By-Law passed by the then Township Council. The Council established and kept up this road, as on the Shaver property was a grist-mill, saw-mill and store, and Shaver paid \$250 for the opening up of said roat. Mr. Geo. Elliott now asks the Council to close up the road and dispose of tue land as it is injurious to him, and has ceased to be a public beneat. Mr. Smoke argued the case on behalf of Mis. Thompson, the present owner of the Shaver property. He worked hard for his client, and apparently thinks he has a good case in hand. Mr. Elliott followed and ably supported the plea of the petitioners that the road should closed as the mills have disappeared, and it is no longer a benefit to the public. The Council decided not to pass the By-Law till the Clerk had obtained a legal opinion on several points connected with the case. The minutes will appear in full in next issue.
