FISHERIES TREATY.

By a strict party vote the United States Senate has rejected the Fisheries Treaty. The old troubles between our neighbors and ourselves will again become active. We wish that facts could warrant us to hold out the assurance that the Dominion Government will be as prompt to maintain and defend Canadian rights as it was lavish in its concessions in order to remove the cause of disputes. What will be, however, will be.

The rejection of the Treaty was not the result of patriotism. The Republicans would have none of it simply because it had been negotiated by a Democratic administration. In the Senate, as at present constituted, there are three Republicans more than Democrats. Three was the majority against the ratification of the Treaty. Here is a fine text for a sermon from Goldwin Smith. Never did party show itself more oblivious of country. Both Canadian and American papers generally agreed that the United States had gained everything and had conceded nothing in return. In spite of that the Republicans were unable to accept a benefit, however great, from the hands of detested political opponents.

CANON FARRAR.

Christians of all denominations should feel grateful to Canon Farrar for his eloquent and faithful exposition of what is meant by the phrase 'Christ's Church on earth.' Sin, the common foe, whether of the heart or of the intellect, should be met by a union of Christian forces, not internecine quarrels among themselves. And it is an encouraging sign that the various denominations are beginning to practically acknowledge this.

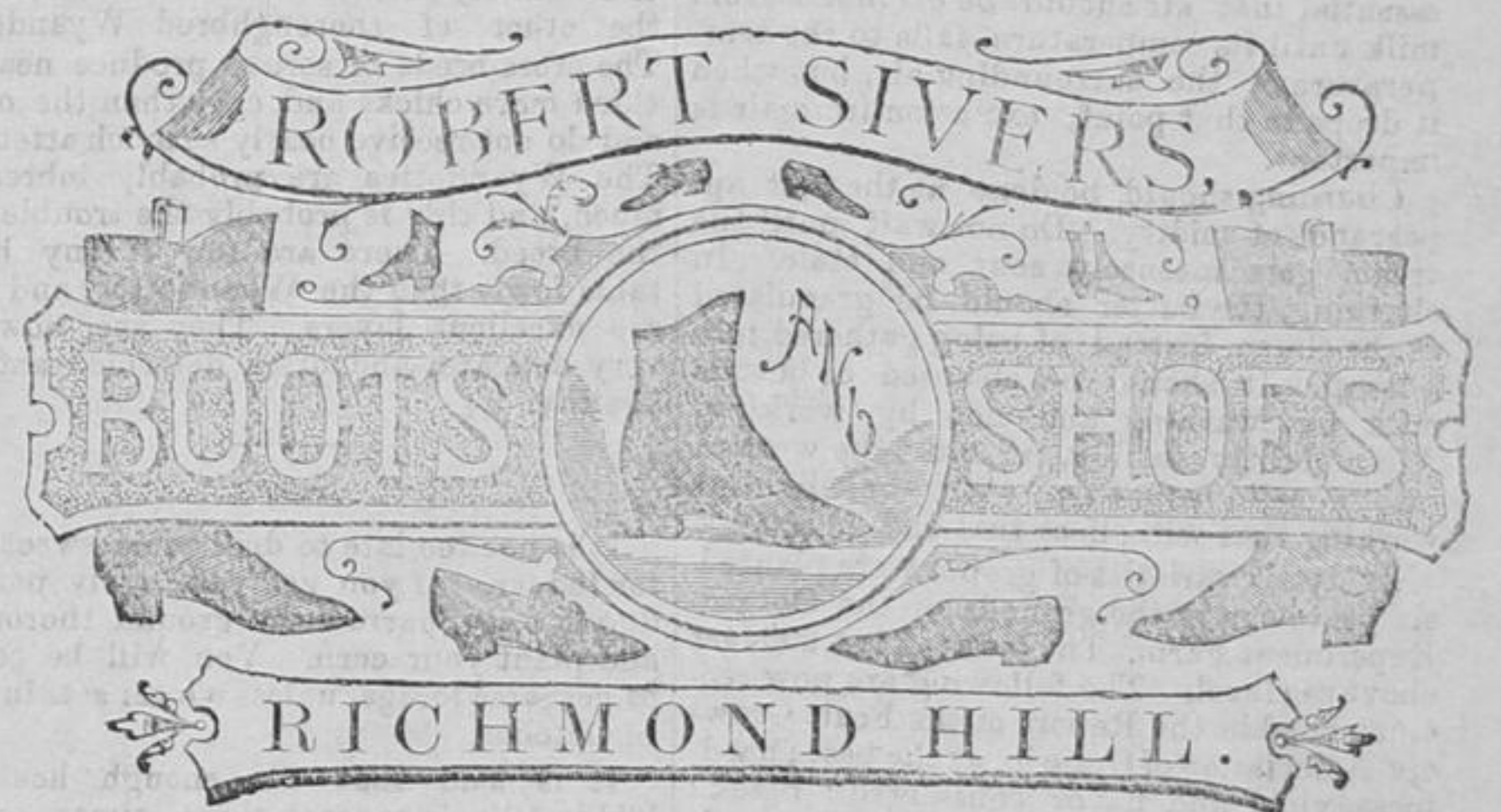
