Fire Brigade.

The Richmond Hill Fire Brigade held a special meeting on Friday evening, the 17th inst. The committee appointed to confer with Maple and vicinity relative to having a Union Excursion to Big Bay Point, reported that they had got the terms from the G. T. R. Company, but that Maple had already dropped out of the proposed trip. The members of the Brigade thought that the price of tickets was a trifle high, viz \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children. Also that the guarantee required was greater than they were prepared to take the responsibility of. On motion of T. F. McMahon, seconded by B. Redditt the proposed picnic to Big Bay Point was dropped for this season. After another discussion it was moved by Fireman Redditt, seconded by Fireman C. Wright that we as a Brigade attend a picnic at Bond's Lake on Friday, the 24th inst., the invitation to be extended to the citizens of this village—Carried. The following were then appointed to make arrangements for the picnic: Messrs. B. Redditt, H. A. Nicholls, T. F. McMahon, C. Wright, C. Trevelyan and R. Kelly. On motion of C. Wright, seconded by W. E. Wiley, Friday, August 24th was proposed as a Civic Holiday and C. Trevelyan and R. Kelly were appointed to circulate a petition asking the Reeve to proclaim that day as such. The picnic committee met on evening of August 21st, all the members being present. The following were reported as having promised to run free busses and rigs to the picnic on Friday:—W. R. Snider, P. Macklen, C. Sheppard; committee on games, G. French, B. Redditt, T. F. McMahon, C. Trevelyan; table committee, Mesdames Savage, Shepard, Trevelyan, G. French, Brownlee, Pugsley, J. Sanderson, W. A. Sanderson and B. Redditt. The following were also appointed waiters: W. D. Atkinson, A. Wright, C. Wright, J. Sanderson, T. French, R. Kelly, M. F. Gray and H. Niemois. After drafting a bill the committee adjourned.

Whitchurch Council.

Saturday last, August 18th, marks a new era in the importance of Oak Ridges. On that day the honorable council of Whitchurch Township sat for the first time, in a commodious room in Curtis' Hotel. All the members of the Council were present as follows:—C. J. Brodie, Reeve; L. L. Hartman, 1st Deputy Reeve; G. Macklen, 2nd Deputy Reeve, and W. A. McCormack and S. Baker, Councillors. Besides the above many prominent gentlemen graced the hall with their presence, among whom were the following: J. W. Collins, Treasurer; J. C. Lundy, Clerk; N. Button, Ringwood; J. Young, White Rose; S. Lloyd, Aurora; R. Thomas, W. Norman, G. Harper, Oak Ridges; Mr. Murphy, of 6th Con. Ex-Reeve Jones, and W. Young, a grit guard from the Penitentiary Reformatory. At noon Messrs. E. J. Davis M. P. P. and Deputy-Reeve Ross, of King, made an informal call and exchanged greetings with Whitchurch's Municipal body. The Council sat to work diligently and during the day transacted a large amount of business. The members discussed the questions which came before them, intelligently, but wasted no time in disputing on minor matters. A petition was presented from Ringwood people reminding the council of the dangerous condition of a bridge in that village, and asking that it be put in proper repair. A petition was also presented asking aid to grade side-line between lots 5 and 6 in 7th concession. A report from W. A. McCormack and S. Baker recommended payment for building wire fence at Musselman's Lake. Mr. Brodie, chairman of a committee reported that having examined pond-hole on Lots 13 and 14 in 6th con., they cannot recommend a culvert, as at present there is a dispute as to the real owner of that particular piece. Your reporter is of the opinion that this case will yet be settled in the courts. A petition was presented from H. Kennedy and several others, asking the council to pay \$2 a week to P. Graham for the maintenance of James Spring, an invalid suffering from cancer. W. A. McCormack moved seconded by G. Macklen that the clerk certify overseers of highways to remove all rolling stone off the road bed in the town. ship—Carried. A By-Law for levying taxes in school sections for the year 1888 was read a first and second time. By-Law was read a third time in committee of the whole, Deputy Hartman in the chair, and afterwards passed. Taxes for County and Township purposes were placed as follows:—General purposes \$2370.00; School Sections \$471.00; Industrial Home \$474.00. The total assessment of the Township was found to be \$1,965,627, taxes required \$2358 75 necessitating a rate of 12 cents in the \$100. After various other matters were disposed of the Council adjourned to meet at Ballantrae on Saturday, the 6th of October. All seemed well satisfied with the accommodations afforded them, and it is expected will not be long till this honorable body again lavishes the most part of the township's wealth in an official capacity.

School Board Meeting.

The Richmond Hill School Board held a special meeting on Monday last, the 20th inst.

Members present Messrs. J. Brown, (Chairman) W. Trenen, J. A. E. Switzer, M. Naughton, A. Russell, J. Duncan, R. Marsh, I. Crosby and Dr. Wilson.

The following bills were presented:—From Mr. M. H. Keefler, printing postal cards \$3 00; Mr. T. H. Redditt, Express charges on Registers, postage &c. 75 cts.

On motion of R. Marsh, seconded by M. Naughton the above accounts were ordered to be paid.

Mr. Marsh introduced a discussion relative to raising the fees of High School pupils. He moved that they be \$9 00 a year as they would then be lower than any other High School in the county, a statement which was not questioned by any member present. Mr. Crosby seconded the motion. Mr. Naughton spoke against the motion, as he doubted the feasibility of raising the fees until the beginning of the year at least. The motion was put from the chair and carried.


The engaging of a Head Master in place of Mr. Redditt, resigned, was then taken up. Altogether ten applications for the position were received. After a careful examination of their qualifications, testimonials &c., it was decided to offer the position to one of the four following applicants: L. A. Kennedy, Graduate of Victoria University, Cobourg; H. Crawford, Toronto University; H. M. McCuaig, Queen's College, Kingston or D. Spencer Skinner, Toronto University. The Board then adjourned.
