LOSE NO TIME.

The High School opened this week with a very good attendance, fully as many as can be expected at this season of the year. There will be quite an addition next Monday, as it was thought by some the school would not open until the first Monday in September. We would say, to those especially who were unsuccessful at the late examination, *commence at once.* When a candidate fails only by a few marks in one or two subjects he is often reluctant in renewing his studies, thinking there will be plenty of time to brush up a few days before the next examination. This is a wrong impression, and the sooner parents recognize this error the better. The next set of questions may run altogether in a different groove, so that it is quite possible for a pupil to make less marks on certain papers even after a year's solid study, though his average will undoubtedly be much better. We repeat that those intending to present themselves at next year's examination should not lose a month nor yet a week, but should settle down to diligent study immediately. In this way success is almost certain.

RETALIATION.

Were it not that the Presidential election takes place in a few months President Cleveland's retaliation threat might look somewhat serious to Canada. But it seems that the President, too, is a politician, and that in the United States everything has to clear the way for politics no matter what may be in the background. Some there are who predict a disruption of friendship and good will between the American and British nations, but the general opinion is, it is only an election controversy between a Republican Senate and a Democratic President. There is no doubt Mr. Cleveland was anxious that the Fishery Treaty should pass, but this in itself was sufficient to cause its overthrow in the Senate. Little can now be expected until after the November election, but when the chief magistrate is again firmly seated in his chair for the next four years the question will in all probability be again opened up for arbitration.

Should retaliation be resorted to Canada would undoubtedly suffer, but this would be little satisfaction to our neighbors to the south when by restricting commercial intercourse they would be the greatest losers. Maine and her neighboring states would be the first to cry out if their shipping facilities were interfered with, but the effect would be greatly felt all along the border. It looks like retaliation with a vengeance when for prohibiting Americans fishing in Canadian waters the President wishes to stop the transportation of all foreign imports through the United States to Canada, all Canadian exports through the United States to foreign countries, and to stop the transportation of all American goods through Canada in bond.

HALTON ELECTION.

The friends and advocates of Unrestricted Reciprocity scored another victory last week in the Halton election, as that proposed measure was the chief question at issue. It is true the majority is a modest one, but when it is considered that Mr. Henderson, the Conservative candidate, carried the riding six months ago by 147, and last week

was defeated by 27 votes, the figures certainly show to a disadvantage for the restrictionists. In the former part of the campaign the question of temperance was well to the front, but as both candidates were avowed prohibitionists it is doubtful if the final result was by this altered either one way or the other. No doubt some of the enthusiastic followers of the Dominion Alliance voted against Mr. Waldie, but this would be about balanced by the level-heads who thought it safer to judge a man by his past record rather than by a forced pledge just on the eve of an election. Mr. Waldie when in parliament always threw his influence against the liquor interests, and now that he is again elected the temperance people may well congratulate themselves that they have secured such a valuable assistant to help them in their struggle.

The result of this election should have a good effect on the country in general. It shows at once that Reciprocity is not the fad its enemies endeavor to make it out to be. It is undeniably popular, and the more it is ventilated the stronger are its claims to popularity. No doubt the time will come when this question of Continental Free Trade will be debated on its merits, and then farmers, lumbermen, fishermen and others will be able to see the reasonableness of the measure.

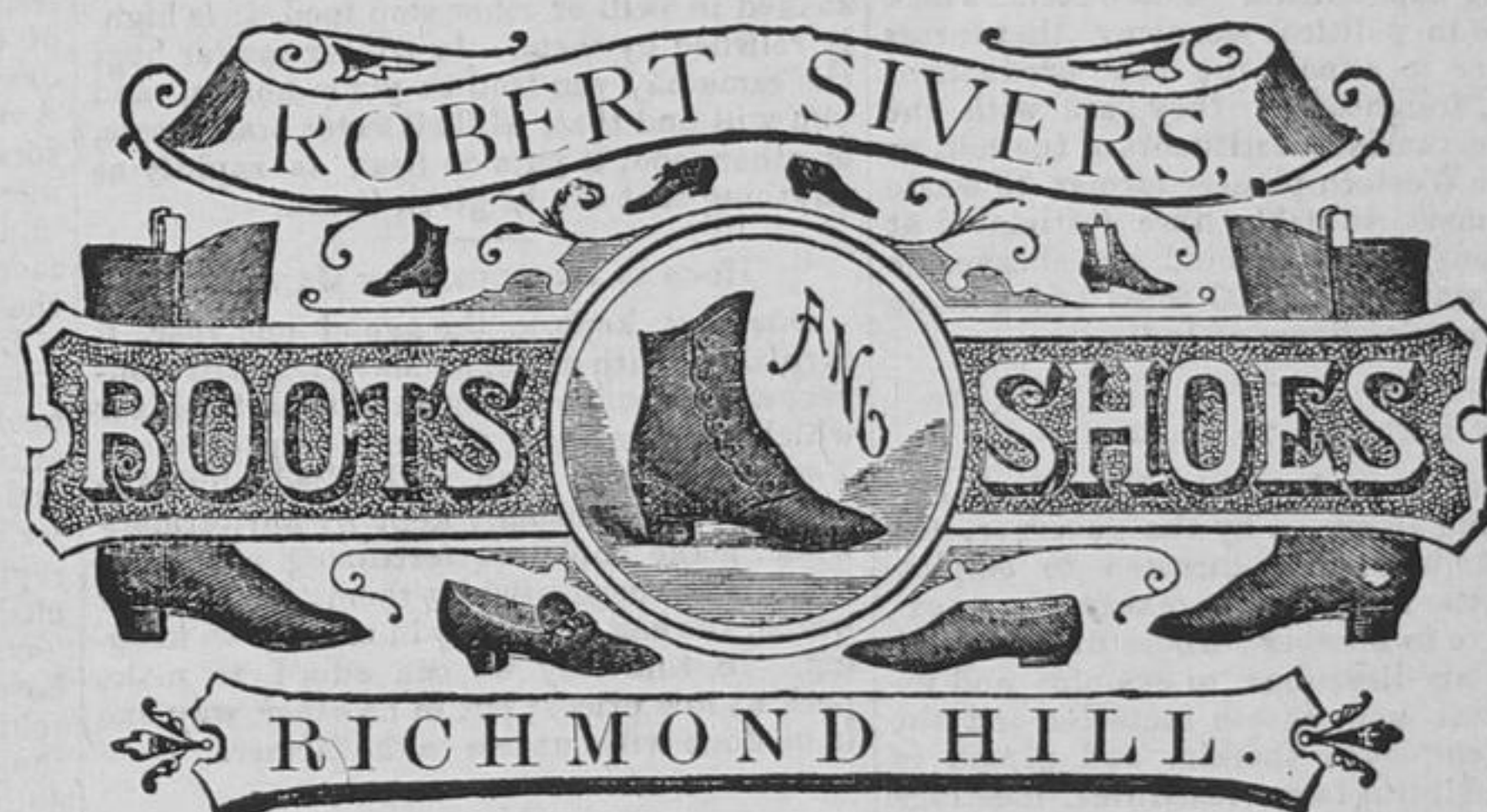
