The annual meeting of the York County W. C. T. U. was held on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, and was in every way a decided success. Mrs. Fawcett responded and made several complimentary comments on the address of the previous speaker. She agreed with him that the R. T. of T. was closely allied with the W. C. T. U., and freely admitted the great benefits derived from the former lodge, especially the insurance feature. She accepted the greeting with gratitude on behalf of her fellowworkers.

Mrs. Grant extended a welcome in the form of a poem to the visiting sisters, to which Miss Foster, Recording Secretary, responded.

Miss Tilley gave a talk on W. C. T. U. work. She divided her subject into five headings, and handled each part well. She advocated earnest prayer in endeavoring to accomplish all good work.

devotional exercises.

Then followed the reading and confirming the minutes of previous session, after which the County report by the Corresponding Secretary was given. An interesting discussion here took place as to whether honorary members should be reported as full members.

Reports of Departments by Superintendents was then called for. Miss Foster, for the Evangelistic and White Shield Department, stated she had made several visits, had corresponded with different people, and believed that earnest evangelistic work was being carried on .

Mrs. Currier reported on Unfermented Wine. She stated that most of the churches in the village and surrounding localities were using the wine as prepared by the W. C. T. U. This report was supplemented by several o' the sisters.

Mrs. J. Spence gave a very full report as Superintendent of Legislation and Franchise Department. She showed that petitions had been circulated and largely signed in many places asking that women should be granted a vote on all questions relating to moral reform. She eloquently contended that marking a ballot for temperance and purity would never unfit a mother for attending to the duties of her own household.
