Runaway Accident.

Rev. G. N. Rutledge had quite an experience while out driving last Monday. Having made an official visit at the residence of Mr. Edmund Brown, 5th Con. Markham, he was driving away, and got out of his buggy to close the gate leading to the road. His well-fed horse, which before that time had been noted for good conduct, suddenly started down the street at a lively pace, leaving his driver to shift for himself. Mr. Brown specially hitched to his carriage, when both minister and layman started in pursuit of the fugitive. They followed for about three-quarters of a mile where they found he had run among some logs and shrubbery on the side of the road and became disengaged from the vehicle. They traced him for another half mile where they found "John" tied to a tree, having been captured by a man just south of Brown's Corners. The horse was apparently none the worse for his misadventure and a quarter dash, but the buggy was pretty badly wrecked. Having "ga'hered up the fragments" and tied the parts together as well as possible, Mr. Rutledge started for home. The rig is now being repaired at Trench's carriage works.

High School Inspection.

Father Teefy's Return.

There arrived here Thursday last from England, in the person of Rev. Father Teefy of the Basilian Order, a man who is most favorably thought of, not only in Catholic circles, where he has gained a great reputation as a speaker, but also among University men, with whom he is very popular, having once been President of the Toronto University Scientific and Literary Society. Two and a half years ago Father Teefy, who had occupied a professorial chair in St. Michael's College, was removed to Plymouth, England, where he continued his work as a professor in the College of Mary the Immaculate. He has been removed to Toronto, where his many friends will be able to greet him again at St. Michael's College. During his visitations abroad Father Teefy visited Rome and toured through many European countries. Shortly after reaching Toronto he went out to Richmond Hill to visit his parents, with whom he will remain for a few days, and Torontonians may shortly expect to hear him preach from the pulpit of St. Basil's.—World.
