**Markham Village v Markham Township.**

This action to recover certain moneys overpaid on an agreement, and for a declaration that there is nothing further to pay under the said agreement, and for an injunction restraining defendants from proceeding, so far as it affects plaintiffs, to raise funds for the payment of certain debentures was heard at Osgoode Hall before Chancellor Boyd, on Friday of last week. The township gave a bonus to the Toronto and Nippissing railway company, and subsequently the village became separated from the township, and they adjusted their liabilities in respect of that bonus by a written agreement. The point involved is as to the construction of that agreement, that is, whether the village is to pay under it one and two tenths mills on the dollar of its assessment until the expiry of the term for which the debentures were issued, or whether the plaintiffs were released in 1881 from further payments because of the fact that by their joint assessments at the time at the rate agreed upon to raise a fund to meet those debentures, the full amount had been made up in the year Osler, Q. C., and W. B. Raymond for plaintiffs. Wm. Macdonald for defendant. Judgment reserved.—Economist.
