

Vaughan Council

The Municipal Council of the Township of Vaughan, met at the Town Hall, on Friday, the 14th day of December, A. D., 1888, at 10 a. m.

The Reeve in the chair. Members present: Messrs. Russell, Reaman, High and Devins.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and on motion approved.

A petition was presented from Wm. Cook and 25 others asking the council to make an appropriation to gravel the side line between Lots 40 and 41 in the 1st Con., and 15 and 16 in the 2nd and 3rd Con.
