Nary a Drink.

For the first time in the history of Toronto on election night, when the police telephoned to the different divisions, it was ascertained that not a single solitary drunk had been arrested all day. This speaks volumes for the efficiency of the election law in having the hotels closed, and is rather a substantial argument in favor of total prohibition. For a city the size of Toronto, with a staff of active policemen and a perfect patrol system that makes the locking up of a drunk a mere pastime, such an event as an election day passing over without any person being arrested for drunkenness might almost be considered an impossibility.—Mail.
