Facts and Figures.

The standing committee on Education in the County Council reported last week as follows, in reference to the High and Model Schools:—The number of students at Newmarket Model School during last term was given as 14, at Parkdale 18. Two new High Schools, Aurora and Parkdale, have been established within the county during the year, and reports from all show an increasing attendance. Weston High School reported a successful year. Markham High School has an attendance of 93, with 11 preparing for university matriculation, Richmond Hill 68, with 8 for matriculation, Newmarket 135 Aurora 44 and Parkdale 192, with 7 teachers, entitling it to rank as a Collegiate Institute. The report recommended a grant of \$350 to each of the High Schools and \$175 to each Model School. The expenditures at the High Schools were:—Weston, \$2,601.98; Markham, \$1,882.95; Richmond Hill, \$2,071.85; Aurora, \$1,597.80; Newmarket, \$3,152.47 and Parkdale, \$27,990.
