Official Notice. The rate of postage upon letters posted in Canada addressed to places within the Dominion or in the United States, will be 3 cents per ounce instead of 5 cents per half-ounce as heretofore. Upon drop letters posted at an office from which letters are delivered by letter carrier, the postage rate will be 2 cents per ounce instead of 1 cent per half-ounce. The rate of postage on drop letters except in cities where free delivery by letter carrier has been established, will be 1 cent per ounce. The fee for the registration of a letter or other article by mail matter, will be 5 cents upon all classes of correspondence passing within the Dominion. For the present and until further instructed the registration fee may be paid by using the 2 cent registration stamps and postage stamps to make up the amount. Letters insufficiently prepaid will be charged double the deficiency as heretofore, provided at least a partial prepayment has been made. Letters posted wholly unpaid will be sent to the Dead Letter Office for return to the writer.

Fined. Last Saturday John Good and Louis McWilliams were up before Messrs. J. M. Lawrence and B. Redditt, J. P.'s, charged by John Woods jr. with throwing stones at his house on the night of the 4th inst. The defendants denied the charge. Mr. Woods' evidence was supported by that of his wife, who said that she heard four stones strike against the house about 11 o'clock p. m., after she and her husband had gone to bed. She felt satisfied that the defendants had fired the stones, as they passed the window a few moments afterwards. Albert Bastingthwaite was the chief witness for the defendants. He maintained that no stones were thrown as he had accompanied defendants from Richmond Hill, and past Woods' house. Mr. Espey, who was also called for the defence stated that he had fired his revolver several times when the boys were opposite Wood's house. The reason he did so, he said,—singular though it may seem—was to frighten the boys, and to make them think that Woods was firing at them. The most damaging part of the evidence was an admission by one of the defendants that he had, on a former occasion, placed a dead musk-rat under complainant's door-step. By this admission the magistrates felt satisfied that complainant had been annoyed by defendants, and imposed a fine of \$2 each, with costs, amounting in all to \$7.
