

News Notes.

Monday was Toronto's civic holiday. The Bradford Witness has no issue this week. An editorial on "Holidays" tells the reason why. Toronto has increased in population from eighty thousand in 1879 to one hundred and eighty thousand in 1889. The Toronto Industrial Exhibition will last from the 9th to the 21st of September. The July official statement shows an increase in the public debt of the Dominion of \$3,474,279 during that month. An eleven-year-old boy named Arthur Daily, was drowned on Saturday evening while bathing in the lagoon at the island. Mr. Hugh Graham's petition concerning the Jesuits Estates Bill has been replied to in the negative. The Royal Templars of Temperance are holding a ten days' camp meeting at Oakville. There appears to be very little chance of a reprieve for Mrs. Maybrick, who has been sentenced to be hanged for poisoning her husband. The law of finding is this: The finder has a clear title against the world but the owner, and the proprietor of a coach or railroad car or ship, has no right to demand anything which may have been found on his property. Such proprietor may make regulations with regard to found property with their employees, but they cannot bind the public. The law was declared by the king's bench a hundred years ago, in which the facts were these: A person found a wallet containing some money on a shop floor. He handed it to the shop-keeper to be returned to the owner. After three years, during which time the owner did not call for his property, the finder demanded the wallet and the money from the shop-keeper. The latter refused to deliver them up on the ground that they were found on his premises. The finder then sued the storekeeper, and it was held as about set forth that "against all the world but the owner the title of the finder is perfect."

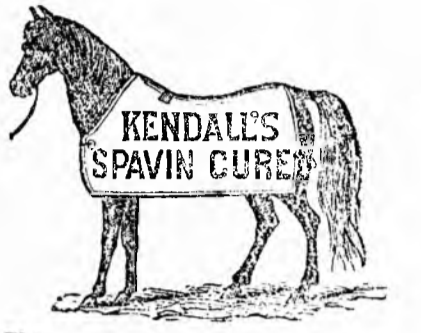
