**NEVER SATISFIED.**

Several of the Conservative papers of the country are now endeavoring to show that the resolution of loyalty moved by Mr. Mulock, member for North York, is something altogether uncalled for. They say it will excite suspicion instead of allaying it, and that there is no reason to suppose that Canadians are not loyal. There is nothing absurd in Mr. Mulock's motion, although we feel satisfied that a feeling of loyalty extends throughout the length and breadth of this Dominion. And though this is the case it is a common thing for Tories to raise the cry that the Reformers are a disloyal set of individuals. If the latter express a desire for better commercial relations with our neighbors across the lines the Tories will shout that a plot is being established against the Government. Only two weeks ago the York Herald reported Dr. Orr as saying at a Conservative meeting held at Weston that "Reformers were planning reasonable measures, such as Commercial Union, etc."

We believe the resolution was intended not so much to prove to Queen Victoria that her Canadian subjects were loyal, as to disabuse the minds of American statesmen of the idea that Canada is pining for annexation. Few men think that Canada will always remain a colony as at present, but though Sir John Macdonald has said that Annexation would be preferable to Independence, we believe that the men of today who would vote for Annexation are a mere handful.

**A ONE SIDED MOTION.**

On Wednesday of last week the York County Council passed the following resolution: "That at the expiration of the present leases of the York roads, all tolls on the said roads be abolished, and the roads maintained by a general rate on the county, those local municipalities into which or along which those roads do not run being exempt from such rate; and that the committee on By-laws and Legislation are hereby instructed to secure, if necessary, legislation to carry out this resolution."

There seems to have been a doubt in the minds of those who voted for the resolution whether any legislation was necessary. We would think legislation would be quite necessary, and it is very doubtful if the Ontario Government will grant anything which appears so one sided. The scheme is unjust to many rate-payers in the county. Newmarket, Stouffville, Markham village, Woodbridge, Weston, Georgina and North Gwillimbury will be exempt. We fail to see the justice in placing a "general tax" on rate-payers residing on the 9th or 10th of King and Vaughan, who use Yonge St. very little, and allowing Newmarket people within three-quarters of a mile of the stone road to travel it free of charge.
