It was decided that the Directors should meet again on the 23rd of May, at 1 o'clock, when it is hoped there will be a good attendance, as much work will have to be done on that afternoon to get ready for the fair on the day following. Special Meeting.

A special meeting of the Richmond Hill Mechanics' Institute was held on Saturday evening, May 3rd, 1890. Members present Messrs. A. R. Innes, W. H. Pugsley, H. M. McCuaig, W. A. Sanderson, H. A. Nicholls, R. E. Law, G. Newbery, Dr. Wilson, T. F. McMahon. Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted. Accounts amounting to \$43.96 were presented and ordered to be paid. A letter was read from Mr. D. W. Campbell, of Kingston, offering to give an entertainment for the Mechanics' Institute during the month of May. Moved by W. H. Pugsley, seconded by Dr. Wilson that the Secretary be instructed to write Mr. Campbell in view of accepting his offer in furnishing entertainment. Messrs Pugsley and McCuaig were appointed to audit the books of the Secretary and the Treasurer. The Secretary was instructed to secure the Young Ladies' Journal and The Quiver for the Library, and the meeting adjourned.

Headford.

The Dairy Maids' entertainment at Headford last Tuesday evening, was a novel affair, and exceedingly enjoyable. Some fifteen young ladies conducted the whole entertainment from beginning to end. These were dressed in print dresses, Turkey red ground with a white flower, and caps of the same and white aprons. The tables were loaded with a great variety of cookery in which the milk of the cow forms an important part. The only danger was, that those not accustomed to such diet would be apt to indulge too freely. After refreshments, the Dairy Maids gave their entertainment in the Church. Miss E. Lunan presided with good ability and lady-like modesty. The programme consisted of Songs, Choruses and recitations, all having reference more or less to farm life and work. The rain in the evening no doubt kept some away, yet the attendance was very good, and all spent a very happy evening. The young ladies of Headford certainly deserve great credit for their zeal and skill in all good work.

Mass Meeting.

A large and enthusiastic gathering assembled in the Masonic Hall last evening, and listened with interest to the addresses delivered by Mr. G. B. Smith and Dr. Gilmour, the Reform Candidates for East and West York respectively. Mr. Wm. Trench occupied the chair. On opening he gave an invitation to Mr. D. W. Clendenan, Mr. John Gibson, or any representatives of these gentlemen, to take their places on the platform. The hall was crowded to the door. Quite a large number of ladies were present, and Markham and Vaughan were well represented. Dr. Gilmour was the first to speak. He went hurriedly over the record of the Mowat Government during the past eighteen years, and showed the many schemes the Conservatives juring that time had tried in order to secure the treasury benches. In 1883 they appealed to the prejudices of the Catholics, in 1884 they endeavored to gain power by "The Bribery Plot," in 1886 they tried the Ross Bible, and now they were raising the sectarian cry. He regretted that his opponent was not present, as there were many things he would prefer to say to his face, rather than behind his back. Mr. G. B. Smith followed. He also regretted exceedingly that Mr. Gibson had not attended. He had invited that gentleman to meet him at Eglinton, at Thornhill and Richmond Hill, but in no case had he responded. This seemed absurd. If Mr. Gibson has a platform he should come forward and state it. All that he knew of his opponent's platform was that it was against the Government. Mr. Smith took up the alleged School Book Monopoly, the French Schools, &c., to which we will refer at greater length next week. The meeting closed with cheers for the Queen and Mr. Mowat.

President A. R. Innes in the chair. Minutes of last Annual Meeting read and approved.

The Secretary's report for the past year was read. It showed that the Institute had a membership of 118, and that all the money for the sale of tickets, namely \$56 75, had been received and paid over to the Treasurer.

On motion of Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Moodie, the above report was adopted.

The Treasurer's report showed the Receipts to be \$146.65; Expenditure \$133.23 leaving a balance of \$13.42.

Of the amount expended \$62.37 was for books and magazines.

On motion of Mr. Nicholls, seconded by Mr. Story, the Treasurer's report was adopted, subject to the approval of the Auditors.

The Librarian's report showed that 38 Volumes had been added during the year; 1272 volumes in library, and that 1309 volumes had been issued during the year.

On motion of Mr. Trevethan, seconded by Mr. Clubine, the report was adopted.

It was moved by Mr. McCuaig, seconded by Mr. Nicholls that the thanks of this Institute be tendered to Miss Teffy, Miss Trench, Miss Story and Miss McKittrick for their valuable services in selling membership tickets.—Carried.

The Election of Officers for the ensuing year then took place and resulted as follows:—President, H. M. McCuaig; 1st Vice-President, G. Newbery; 2nd Vice-President, P. G. Savage; Secretary, T. F. McMahon; Treasurer, W. A. Sanderson. Committee of Management: W. Trench, J. E. Clubine, H. A. Nicholls, W. H. Pugsley, A. R. Innes, R. E. Law, A. Moodie, C. Trevethan.

After short addresses from the retiring president and the newly-elected officers the meeting adjourned.

Newton Brook

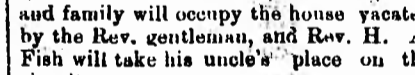
