First Practice.

The Fire Brigade held their first practice of the season on Monday evening. In the absence of the Captain, Lieut Savage took charge of the men. There was an excellent turn-out; nearly every member of the Company seemed to be at his post. When orders were given a start was made from the fire-hall; the engine, hose-reel and hook-and-ladder apparatus were taken to the tank, corner of Yonge and Richmond Sts, and work began. Foreman Redditt's department uncoiled the hose, and the hook-and-ladder men, under command of Foreman Sheppard, ascended the roof of the Fire Proof Store. As the old hose was used that evening, it burst in three different places at different times, so great was the pressure. Three times did the men supply 50 ft lengths of hose, and water was again thrown on the building in the very good time of 4 1/2 minutes after leaving the fire-hall. After some sharp practice the engine and hose were taken to the tank in front of the High school, and the neighboring places were sprinkled. From the work done it would seem the company were better in better shape.

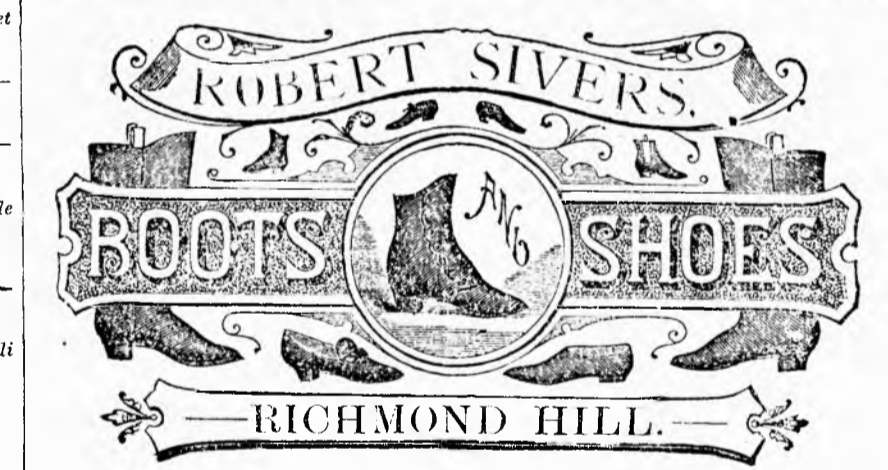
