QUEEN'S BIRTH-DAY
AT RICHMOND HILL.

The Fair A Great Success.
OVER 1000 AT THE CONCERT.

On the whole the Richmond Hill and
Yonge St. Agricultural Society never had
a more successful Fair than that of Satur-
day last. The sun came out bright in
the morning, and at an early hour it was
apparent that the exhibits in live stock
at least would be on a large scale. But
the proverbial Queen's weather did not
continue for shortly after noon the clouds
became stiller and ominous and threaten-
ed heavy rain before the close of the day.
However, towards evening old Sol proved
himself stronger than the watery god and
a gorgeous night followed for the concert
which was held in the Agricultural Hall
in connection with the society. The gate
receipts were less than last year but taken
with the proceeds of the concert the amount
received was in advance of any
former year.

The County seemed well represented
from all quarters, and among those present
we might mention the following:—
Mr. G. B. Smith, ex-M. P. P., Dr. Gil-
mour, ex-M. P. P., Mr. John Gibson,
Messrs. J. Armstrong, Wm. Cook, Geo.
Keith, Frank Denton, J. Craig, Editor
of the Live Stock Journal, of Toronto;
Simpson Rennie, Scarborough; J. C. Lundy,
Jonathan Slater, Markham; Thos. Lloyd,
G. Smith, Whitechurch; Alex. Cameron,
J. Malloy, W. T. Robinson, Leeds Rich-
ardson, J. McNeil, Vaughan. The per-
formances of Dorenwend, Dickie & Com-
pany, on the slack wire, trapeze &c.
were good, and many of their exercises
were rendered more enjoyable by the
music furnished by the Maple Band.
These musicians played well and received
many flattering compliments during the
afternoon. Of the exhibits the horses
took first place. Seldom can so much
good stock be seen at large county shows.
Russell Bros showed 2 two-year-old im-
ported stallions, 1 one year old imported
stallion, 2 yearling Clydesdale fillies, 1
two year old Clydesdale filly, a team of
general purpose horses and a brood mare
and cart horse which weighed that day
1970 lbs. They also showed 16 or 17
head of Durham cattle besides one or two
grades. In Herefords Mr. C. Holmes
had a fine herd. In Leicester and Cots-
wold sheep P. Boynton and Thos. F.
Boynton & Son were the chief exhibitors,
and in Southdowns Mr. B. Marsh took
all the prizes. In Swine the honors fell
to Thos. F. Boynton, Frisby Bros. and
Padget & Sons. W. & A. Wright were
the largest exhibitors in poultry. The
ladies' department was not up to the
standard, and the bulk of the prizes fell
to three or four exhibitors. In accord-
ance with an agreement among manufac-
turers the display of implements was
small. Henry's Sons, Aurora, showed a
very fine self-binder, and A. Fleury and
Sons, Stouffville, had a dog power churn
which attracted considerable attention.
Other specials were a Hay and Grain ele-
vator by Savage and Nicholls, C. Mason's
display of soves, R. Sivers' large and
elegant display of Boots and Shoes, O. J.
Brown's New Williams' sewing machines
&c. There were also 12 open and covered
buggies from Trench's carriage works, and
a good exhibit of furniture by P. G.
Savage. Mr. Jos. Duncumb, Photographer,
Newmarket, took home with him
two rat traps and a blue one for some
half dozen excellent casts of pictures and

other pictures which were on exhibition.
