On motion the invitation from Kincardine was declined, and the Sec'y was instructed to write Kincardine. Moved by Foreman Sheppard, seconded by Fireman W. Whyte, that this Brigade give the invitation to attend a Tournament in Galt on 13th & 14th of June its favorable consideration, and if circumstances permit will attend.—Carried.

An Express Company Employee Killed.
A sad accident occurred at West Toronto Junction, on the C. P. R. on Thursday night about 9 o'clock whereby Geo. Ezzard, a driver of the Dominion Express Company, lost his life. Since the new time table came into force a part of the duty of the deceased was to run out from the city on the Montreal train and assist in transferring the express from the C. V. train, which arrives from the west at the same time. He arrived as usual Thursday night, but attempted to jump off the train while passing the south platform on its way to the main line, and fell under the wheels, the last truck passing over his body. Death was instantaneous. The deceased is married, and a resident of Toronto. Considerable difficulty was experienced in identifying the remains, and for a time it was thought to be a car repairer named Alford who was killed. Coroner Dr. Clendenan viewed the remains and decided an inquest was unnecessary, as no blame whatever is attached to the employes of the railway company. The deceased boarded at 84 Wellington street west. This man was a son of Richard Ezzard, Edgely. He was 30 years of age. He was buried on Sunday June 1st at the Evangelical Church on the townline south of the village.

School Board Meeting.
The Monthly Meeting of the Richmond Hill School Board was held on Monday last. Members present—Messrs. J. Brown, J. Switzer, W. Glass, F. McConaghy, J. Duncan, M. Naughton, R. Marsh, D. Lynet, J. T. B. Lindsay. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. The following accounts were read and, on motion, ordered to be paid:—Sanderson & Bro. Book-binding 60c.; T. F. McMahon, printing and distributing 200 copies of School accounts for 1889, \$3.00. A statement from Mr. McConaghy showed the attendance at the High School for May to be 41. Mr. Clubine reported the average attendance of the Public School 126 2/3 for the month of May. On the suggestion of Mr. Clubine the re-arranging of the seats in the Public school was considered. After a discussion bearing on non-resident pupils attending the school it was moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. McConaghy that in future non-resident pupils be charged 25 cents a month. Carried. The Secretary read the report of Inspector Seath on his last visit to the High School. On motion of Mr. Marsh, seconded by Mr. Lynet, the chairman and secretary were authorized and instructed to borrow the sum of \$500 to meet the current expenses of the Public school.

Late last Saturday night a number of roughs amused themselves by destroying young shade trees in the lower end of the village.

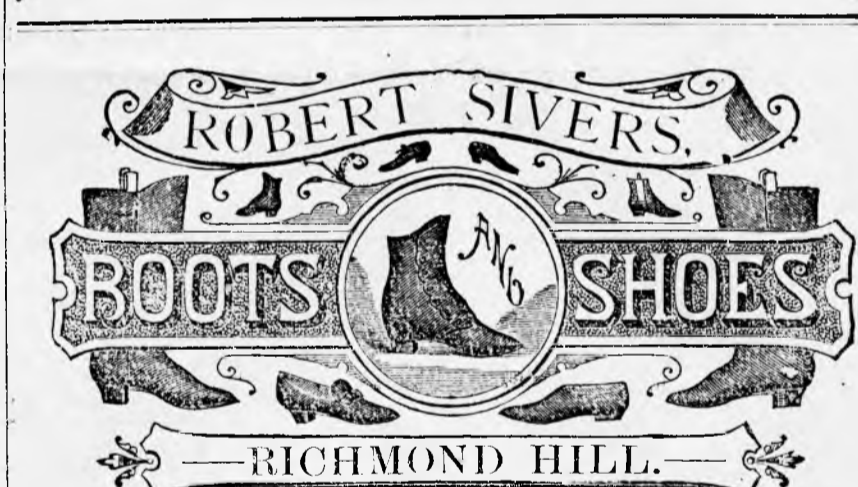
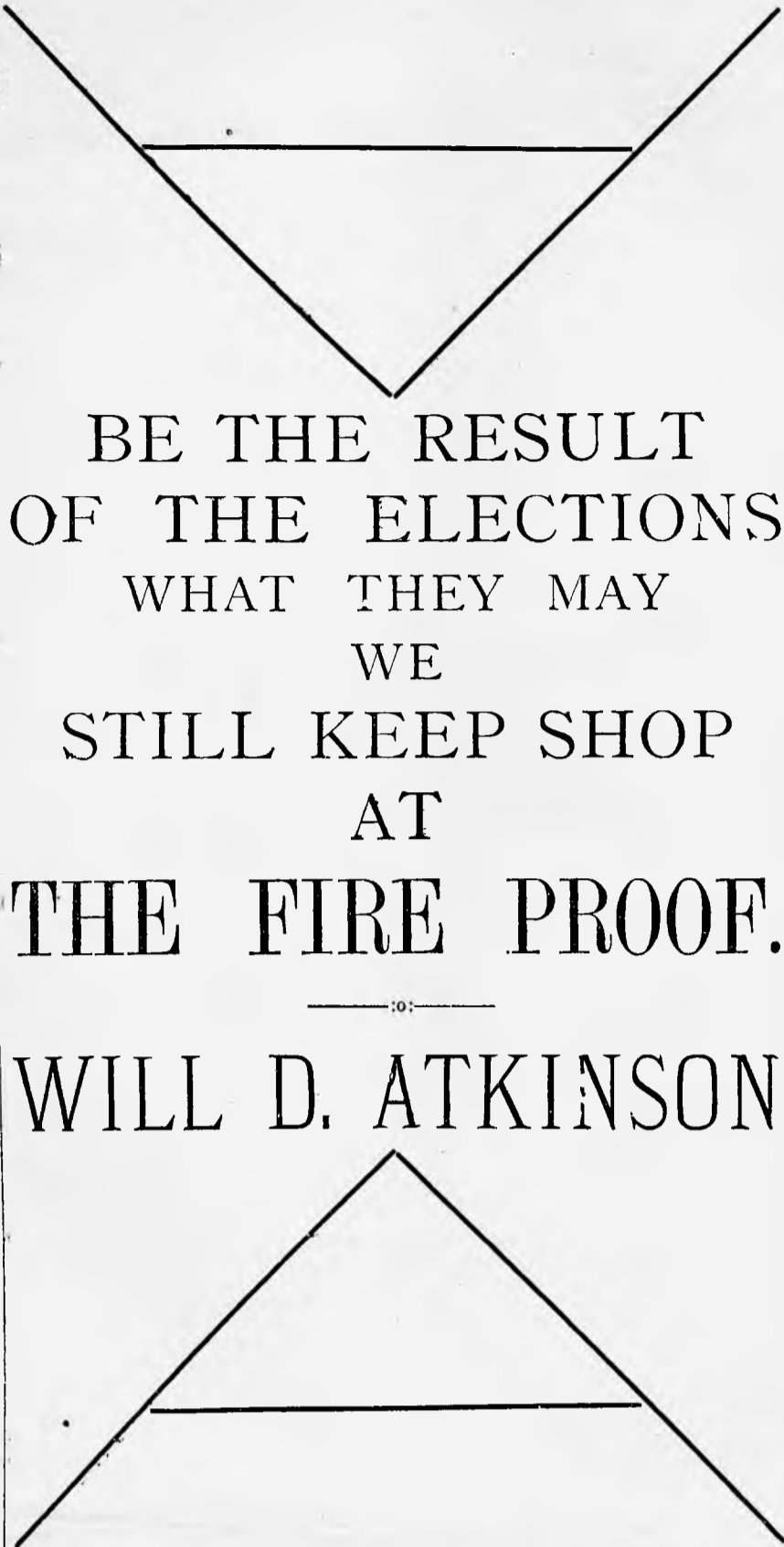
Mr. J. Green of Boston is spending the summer with Mr. R. Parker.
