

Vaughan Council

The Municipal Council of the township of Vaughan met at the Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 27th day of May, 1890, at 10 a. m., as Court of Revision.

The Reeve in the chair. Members present: Messrs. High, Arnold, Watson and Watson.

The members having subscribed and taken the oath of office, proceeded to business.

The following appeals were presented to the Court:

J. Livingston, respecting Livingston estate, should be A. J. Livingston, west half lot 28, Con. 7.

Joseph Maxwell, dog having died. Allan Backa, do Anthony Keffer, do Nicholas Snider, do Gideon Burton, do Wm. Thomas, do

John Ringland, bitch having died. John and George Mason, to be assessed as joint tenants for west half lot 21, Con. 9.

John Nattress, to be assessed as joint tenant with Richard Nattress, lot 20, in the 10th Con.

George Kew, to be assessed as joint tenant on lot 34, Con. 11.

Robert Webster, to be assessed for \$400 income.

Moved by Mr. High, seconded by Mr. Wm. Watson, that the following alterations and additions be made in the assessment roll of the township for the present year, viz:

The Council then met for general business. The reeve in the chair. Members all present.

The minutes of last meeting were read and, on motion, approved.

A petition by Gavin Lawrie and 55 others asking to have the fence removed from off the side-road between lots 20 and 21 in the 7th Concession also to have trees along said road cut down.

A claim for 1 sheep and 1 lamb killed by dog or dogs, valued at \$10 and \$5, respectively, was made by Jonathan Kersy.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. High, that the following sheep claim be paid, being two-thirds value:—To Jonathan Kersy for 2 sheep \$10.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. High, seconded by Mr. R. Watson, that the clerk be and is hereby authorized to notify P. S. Gibson, P. L. S. to stake out the original road allowance from 7th Con. to deviation on side road between Lots 20 and 21 in the 7th Con.—Carried.

No. 1—Caleb Ludford.
No. 3—John Tyndall.
No. 5—M. Naughton.

The Council then adjourned until June 16th.
