The people of this province evidently did not judge him by any individual Act, but by his legislation as a whole.

Had Mr. Mowat been defeated Mr. Meredith would have been called upon to form a ministry. This would have been a difficult task for him as the men at his command are lacking both in ability and experience. People who have confidence in the Dominion Government have confidence in Mr. Meredith and his followers, but beyond this the trust is lost. They cannot easily forget the years spent by Sir John Macdonald in endeavoring to wrest Ontario's rights from her, and how the great Conservative Chieftain was during those years backed up by Mr. Meredith and his party.

And besides all this the leader of the Opposition went to the electors without a substantial platform. The principal cry was for the abolition of Separate Schools, and those who were willing to admit that all schools should be non-sectarian, knew per-Administration on such a point was dishonest and foolish. It will be interesting to watch the course of the opponents of Mr. Mowat during the coming elections for the Dominion Parliament.

Mr. E. J. Davis' majority of 700 over Mr. C. C. Robinson, in North York, does not surprise any person. In fact the Junction Comet in an editorial points to the result as almost a victory for the latter, and expresses excessive joy that the majority was not larger. It states that at the last general election Mr. Robinson was defeated by goo, and congratulates him on the splendid showing he made last Thursday. Friend Stevenson appears to be easily satisfied.
