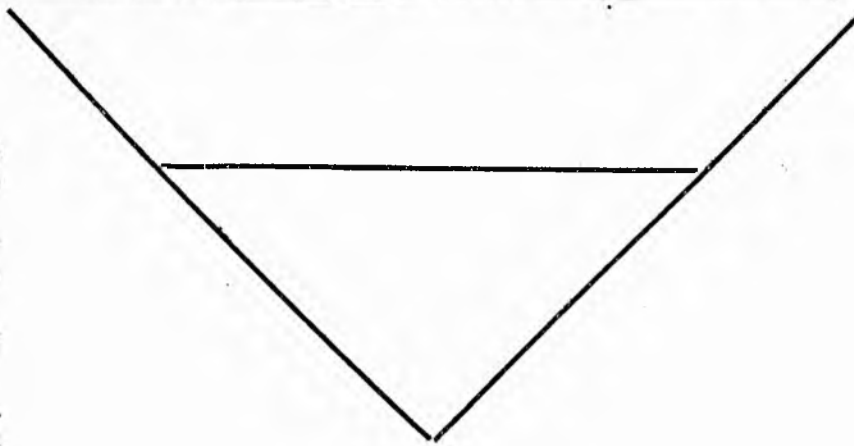
Wedding Bells.

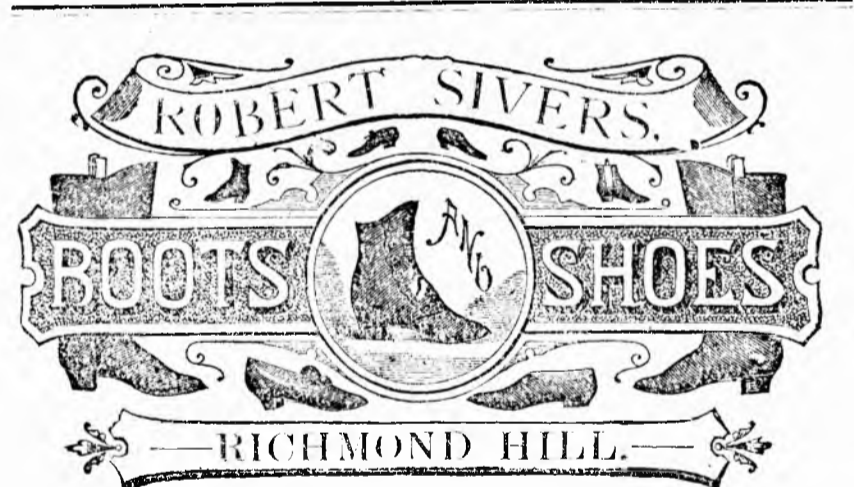
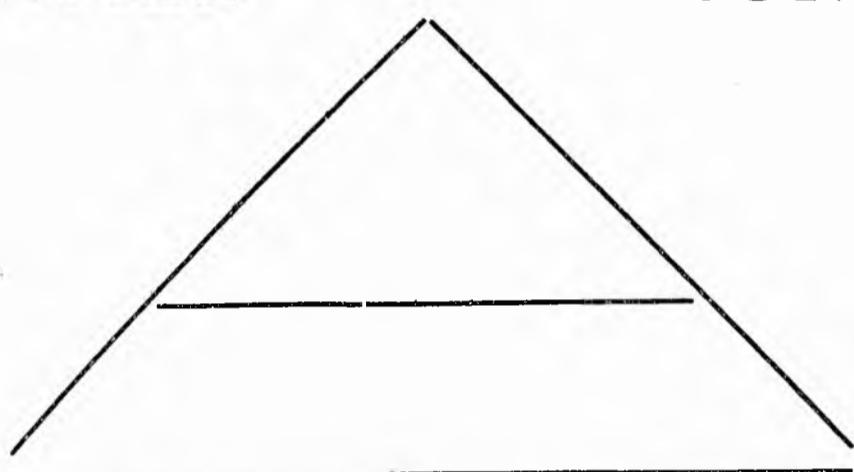
