The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and party left Quebec for England by the ss. Sardinian on Thursday.

The Newmarket Track Association will have horse races in that town on the 30th of June and the 1st of July.

Hon. A. M. Ross, late Provincial Treasurer, has been appointed clerk of York County Court, and has entered upon his new duties.

Mr. G. B. Smith, M. P. P. has asked the Board of Trade to take under their consideration the question of personal taxation.

Cheif Ashfield, of the Toronto Fire Brigade, with which he had been connected since 1839, died on Sunday in the 82nd year of his age.

The Toronto Methodist Conference on Tuesday passed a motion in favor of increasing the pastoral term from three to five years.

The re-count of votes in Prince Edward gives Mr. Sprague, Liberal, a majority of eight and deprives Mr. Meredith of a supporter.

Markham High School board are asking the village Council to grant \$1,600 for the purpose of providing additional High School accommodation.

The wedding of Mr. Wm. O'Brien, the Irish Nationalist, and Mlle. Raffalovitch, daughter of a rich Paris banker, took place one day last week at the Brompton Oratory, London.

Henry M. Stanley has been tendered and has accepted the Governor-Generalship of the Congo Free State. He will enter upon his new duties at the beginning of the year.

In the Surrogate Court on Monday the will of James Lloyd, farmer, of the 3rd concession of Whitechurch, was filed. By it \$7,125 is to be divided among his grandchildren.

West Toronto has made arrangements for a grand celebration on Dominion Day, and has appointed Mayor St. Leger as Chairman, A. B. Rice, editor of the York Tribune, Secretary, and Dr. Gilmour, Treasurer of the Committee.

The York County Council and their friends took their annual excursion to Niagara Falls on Tuesday of last week. While there some of the members witnessed the unpleasant sight of a suicide down the Rapids and over the Falls.

The Local elections in British Columbia on Friday resulted in the return of the Robson Government to power. Quebec followed on Tuesday by returning Mr. Mercier with an increased following. This makes the series of Government victories in the provinces complete.
