

From our Exchanges.

Eight persons were killed by the heat in New York on Thursday.

About 4,000 men are wanted in the North West for harvesting.

The Annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association was held at the Rossin house on Tuesday.

The York Pioneer Association met in the Canadian Institute on Tuesday, Rev. Dr. Scadding presiding.

The Markham Council have been notified to levy \$500 on the corporation for High school purposes for the current year.

Premier Grenway estimates the Manitoba wheat yield at 15,000,000 bushels, while Mr. Shangnessy, of the C. P. R., expects a yield of 17,000,000 in all the northwest.

The heavy rain on Sunday night overflowed the troughs, and went through the roof of Mr. Edward McKeown's store, Yonge St. Toronto, and damaged about \$6000 worth of dress goods.

A C. P. R. express ran into a vehicle at an unprotected crossing at Brockton on Friday, killing the occupants, Patrick Dowling, aged 68, Charles McNeilly, 12, and Peter McLaughlin, 13.

An accident at the "Soo" last week will do damage to ship owners to the value of \$100,000. Eighty-five vessels were in sight at Sault Ste. Marie on Saturday waiting to be let through the locks.

Aurora has made a contract with the G. T. R. to supply that company with water at \$75 a month. The agreement is for two months, after which time new arrangements will be made if the contracting parties are satisfied.

H. A. Massey, the defendant in the \$10,000 libel suit of Taylor v. Massey, was examined on Friday by Mr. John A. Macdonald. The action arises out of the recent wind and section case of Taylor v. Johnston.

Mrs. Reesor, a lady from near Woodstock, and her sister, Miss Anderson, were drowned at Youngstown, N. Y. on Thursday. The ladies, accompanied by the husband of the former, were in bathing, and were carried into deep water by the swell of a passing steamer.

A collision occurred in Toronto on Monday night between two party bands, the Liberty (Roman Catholic) and Pioneer (Protestant). They encountered each other on Queen street, and as is usual on such occasions, there was hissing and cheering on both sides. A row ensued, and the angry crowd had to be dispersed by the police.
