Village Council.

The Village Council held a meeting in the Council Chamber on Friday evening, October 10th.

Members present: Reeve Pugsley, and Councillors Atkinson, Sanderson and Savage

The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

The following accounts were read:—

From C. Mason, dated March 4th, 1890	\$37 47

Moved by Mr. Savage, seconded by Mr. Atkinson, that the above accounts be paid.—Carried.

Mr. Sanderson introduced a by-law to authorize the Treasurer to pay the Reeve, Clerk and Assessor, for their services in selecting jurors, the sum of \$3 each.

By-law was read a first, second and third time and passed.

A by-law was also passed authorizing the levying and collecting of assessments of all rates and taxes authorized by the Statutes of Ontario, in the village of Richmond Hill for the year 1890.

A communication from Mr. J. Arnold, dated Sept. 22nd, offering to lease a piece of land in the village, 8 rods by 5 rods, in which there is gravel, for \$1000, was read.

Moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Atkinson, that this Council cannot entertain Mr. Arnold's offer for gravel.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Savage, the Reeve and Councillor Atkinson were appointed a committee re. gravel for sidewalks and other purposes.

The Reeve reported that he had received a communication from Mr. M. H. Keefer, late of this village, stating that his dog Sandy, commonly known as "The Faithful," had met with an ignominious death on his way to Weston, and asking that he be struck from the assessment roll.

Moved by Mr. Atkinson, seconded by Mr. Savage, that the dog be struck off.—Carried.

The Clerk was authorized and instructed to advertise that those paying their taxes to him on or before the 17th of November would be allowed a discount of 5 per cent., and the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the Reeve or Council.

Moved by Steward McLean, seconded by Fireman Sanderson, that this Brigade hold their annual entertainment on New Year's Night, 1891.—Carried.

Engineer Brownlee moved, seconded by Foreman Sheppard, that the Capt., Sec'y, Lieut., Foreman of Hose, Foreman of H. & L., Steward, Auditors and W. E. Wiley form a committee to consider the nature of entertainment to be held on New Year's Night, and report at next regular meeting.—Carried.

Sec'y Wiley of the band handed to the Sec'y \$10 30, as part payment of dues to Oct. 1st.

The Captain called a special meeting for next Monday evening, when members will meet at hall and march to Agricultural Hall for drill.

Meeting then adjourned.
