and enjoyed the ride in the electric cars. Two deputations were received. Thursday morning, one from Mimico and the other from Chester. The Minico deputation consisted of Messrs. Barlow Cumberland, Joseph Barrett, E. J. Clark and John A. Pinkerton. Mr. Cumberland explained to the Council that they wished right of way for an electric railway running on the Lake Shore road as far west as Lorne Park, and eventually east to Scarboro' Junction. The natter was referred to the Property Committee. The Chester deputation were heard in the Committee of the Whole in reference to the census of Chester. Messrs. Colin McKinnon, W. H. Walbridge and Postmaster Bates defended the genumeness of the list, but the Council decided to take no action. The engineer was in structed to examine Eagle bridge over the Humber, which was reported to be in a dangerous state. Mr. Anderson said there were rumours that \$2,000 had been wrongfully paid the Industrial Home, and persuaded the Council to adopt a motion instructing the Treasurer to prepare a statement of the amounts paid the home. Water From Lake Simcoe.

A comple of weeks ago a company of surveyors passed through this village taking measurements as they proceeded from Toronto to lake Simcoe, in order, to report to the City Council as to the ferrerbility of carrying the water from the northern lake to the inhabitants of Toronto. The committee have since reported to the waterworks committee as the following letter over the signatures of Messrs, McLephan Stuart & Chapman, shows

"We have recently completed a survey of the country between Toronto and Lake Simcoe with a view of ascertaining the feasibility and approximate cost of supplying your city with water from Lake Sir coe by gravitation.

We find there is a fall of 473 feet between Lake Simcoe and Lake Ontario in a distance of 39 miles, which of course 14 ample for gravitation purposes

An approximate estimate of t1 e cost ef the work has also been prepared, and, from all the data within our reach, we find it possible to supply the city with six'y miltion gallons per day for a total outlay of \$5,000,000. We are now congaged in furnishing maps and plans, etc., and would be glad to lay the whole ject before you for consideration, should you so decide."
