The Late Mrs. Glover.

Mrs. Mary Glover, widow of the late Thomas Glover, passed peacefully away on Thursday last. She had lived considerably over the allotted time of man, being 81 years, 2 months when the death messenger came. The funeral took place on Saturday and was attended by a large number of relatives and friends. Previous to the burial a very impressive sermon was preached in the Methodist church by Rev. J. C. The minister also referred to her clear mind at such an advanced age, and spoke of her readiness to direct him to many passages of Scripture in her well-read bible—a bible which she had purchased when a girl by paying the amount, some 10 or 12 shillings, in weekly penny installments. A somewhat uncommon feature of the funeral, but one which might be encouraged when practicable, was the carrying of the remains by her six sons—Edward, John, Edwin, William, Robert and George. Deceased was interred in the village cemetery beside her husband whose tombstone bears evidence that the husband had preceded his companion just ten years to a day. Both were natives of Devonshire, England.

The Jones Family.

The entertainment given in the Masonic Hall on Tuesday evening by the Jones Family and Company, of Toronto, scarcely gave as good satisfaction as was predicted in THE LIBERAL last week. Most of the performers, however, being mere juveniles it was not to be expected they would successfully take the parts of those with greater experience. Some of the selections were really good if the age of the youngsters were to be taken into consideration. Several of the members of the family possess a good deal of natural musical talent which will not fail to be appreciated after a course of careful training and arduous application. The programme opened with a piano duet by Master George and Miss Maude. Then followed a Scotch song by Miss Katie Counts which was encored, when she responded by singing "Comin' thro' the rye." This young singer possesses a remarkably clear and strong contralto voice and should make her mark among the musicians if properly trained. Miss Lillie Long's Irish Recitations were amusing, and Master Tom's cornet solo was encored. The exhibition of club swinging was very good and appeared to be enjoyed by all. In the musical tableau "The Angels' Serenade" was well performed. It is to be regretted that the order in certain parts of the hall did not do credit to a Richmond Hill audience. No part of the entertainment was such as to cause misbehavior, and those who did not care to listen to the little boys and girls should at least have respected the feelings of others. During the evening Mr. Jones, the manager, made the unhappy remark that some present had eluded the vigilance of the door-keeper by presenting bogus tickets. After the concert, however, Mr. Jones stated that his remarks were only intended for a few boys, and wished the committee to understand that no slur was meant to be cast on the integrity of the audience.

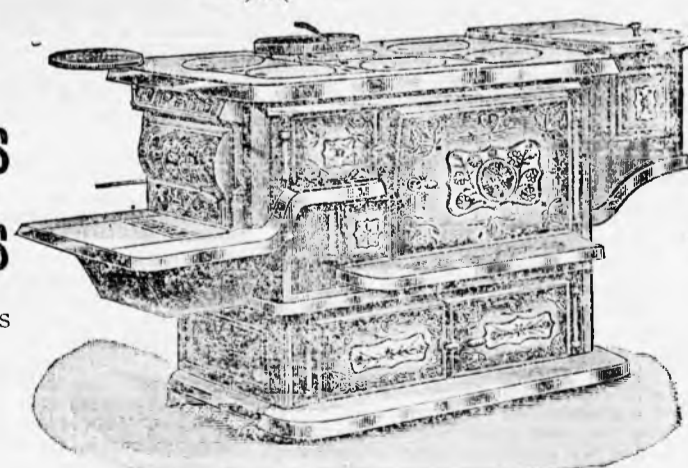
