Dr. E. P. Gordon, the well known
Toronto lacrosse player, has been appoint-
ed surgeon on the C. P. R. Pacific steam-
er Express of India which sails between
Vancouver and Japan. His departure
from the city will leave a vacancy in the
Toronto that will be difficult to fill.

The result of Saturday's meeting of the
Irish Nationalist members of the House
of Commons was that Mr. Justin Mc
Carthy, upon Mr. Parnell's refusal to
put a motion, left the room followed by
forty four other members. These anti-
Parnellites then organized and Mr. Mc-
Carthy was appointed chairman.

Markham Council.

The Markham Township Council met
at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Satur-
day, 29th November. Members all
present; Reeve in the chair. Minutes
of last meeting read and confirmed.

Communications were received from
Mrs. Mary Thompson re culvert; Mrs.
Kennedy re flooding her farm; M. Jones,
reeve, Whitechurch, with statement of
expenditure on townline.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Slater,
moved that the treasurer pay S. Ritter
\$7.50, for renewing culvert, lot 12, Con-
cession 3.

Mr. Gould, seconded by Mr. Slater,
moved that the treasurer pay Carson &
Son \$6, amount of account in full for
printing collector's receipts, etc.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Gould,
moved that the treasurer pay the follow-
ing gravel accounts: Watson Collinson,
176 yds., S. H. Reeve, R. O., \$17.60;
J. B. Freeman, 20 yds., A. Malcolm, R.
O., \$2; Wm. Armstrong, 92 yds., B.
Hagerman, R. O., \$9.20; John Horsley,
16 yds., David Duncan, R. O., \$1.60;
Jos. Grove, 34 yds., W. Hagan, R. O.,
\$2.40.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Schmidt,
moved that the treasurer pay M. Jones,
Esq., \$4, being half amount of costs of
repairing culvert on the north townline,
on order of the reeve.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Gould,
moved that the treasurer be and is here-
by authorized to pay the following ac-
counts, for work and material furnished
this municipality.

J. A. Mitchell, for drawing plank for
bridge in Division 58, \$2; Adam Scott,
for 125 tiles, 3 inches, being put in two
drains across Church Street, \$1.37; L.
Vanzant, for repairing culvert on side-
line, Lots 20 and 21, Concession 9, \$4.75.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Schmidt,
moved that in regard to the communi-
cation from Mary Thomson, Mr. Slater
be appointed a committee to examine
water course and put in culvert if deemed
necessary.

Mr. Gould, seconded by Mr. Scott,
moved that the reeve be instructed to
purchase wood for Mrs. Mary Doherty of
Boxgrove, amount not to exceed \$4, if
satisfactory evidence is found that the
said Mary Doherty is not in a position to
maintain herself.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Scott,
moved that when this council adjourns it
stands adjourned till Monday the 15th
day of December next.

Mr. Gould introduced a By-law to
provide for the election of reeve, deputy
reeves and councillor for 1891. Leave
given. By-law read a first time. On
motion by law read a second time, and
council went into a committee of the
whole. Mr. Schmidt in the chair.
The committee rose and reported. By-law
with blanks filled as follows: J. Stephenson,
Returning Officer, and Deputy. Re-
turning Officers as follows: D. I. Thom-

hill, Arthur Morgan; 2, Elgin Mills,
Edwin Sisley; 3, Brown's Corners, Thos.
Thomson; 4, Victoria Square, John Mc-
Cague; 5, Unionville, J. Stephenson; 6,
Cashel, Harvey Quantz; 7, Lot 8, Con. 5,
Geo. Robb; 8, Milnesville, P. L. Barkey;
9, Cedar Grove, James Malcom; 10, Mon-
golia, Malcom Boyles. On motion the
report was received, adopted and the By-
law read a third time and passed.

Mr. Gould asked leave to introduce a
By-law to fix the salaries and regulate
duties of municipal officers. Leave given
By-law read a first time. On motion
By-law read a second time and council
went into committee of the whole thereon,
Mr. Slater in the chair. The committee
rose and reported the By-law as amended
and blanks filled. The report received
and adopted, and By-law read a third
time and passed.

On motion the council adjourned.
