Were it not that there is a duty of five cents a dozen on eggs entering the United States that country would afford the best market in the world for Canadian eggs. As it is the McKinley Bill has almost killed the trade. During the month of April of last year 450,623 dozens were shipped from this country, whereas in the same month of this year the number is 24,892 dozens. The figures are taken from the trade returns of the United States. True, the price here is very good, but a pretty good idea of what it would be without the duty, can be got by comparing the present prices on both sides of the line.

The Conservative papers are much at variance about the appointment of Mr. Abbott as Prime Minister. Not a few were in favor of giving the leadership to Mr. W. R. Meredith. Toronto Saturday Night has expressed itself very strongly on this matter, and says:—"I am firmly convinced that Mr. Meredith is the only man who can hold the Conservatives of Ontario together, and that if his help is not obtained, the smaller politicians of this province will not work harmoniously together, and the result will be disastrous." The World has spoken equally as strong, and in its last issue the Comet, of Toronto Junction, has the following:—"With all due regard for Mr. Abbott, the newly appointed Premier, we cannot but fall in with the views of 'Don' in Saturday night, wherein he suggests the name of Mr. W. R. Meredith as leader of the Dominion Government."

The Council of the Municipality of Vaughan met at the Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 16th day of June as adjourned Court of Revision.

Andrew S. Russell, reeve, chairman. Members present—Messrs. Arnold, Watson and Bryson.

The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion confirmed.

The following appeals which were laid over from last meeting were disposed of as follows:

Rev. D. Camelon's name struck off and the Rev. U. A. Campbell's name inserted and assessed for 10 acres instead of 1 acre of lot 21, Con. 3, and assessment increased from \$600 to \$900.

The assessment of Mark Robinson; also the assessment of Thos. Lane, confirmed.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by Mr. Bryson, that the Assessment Roll as revised be finally passed by this court and certified by the court as so passed and that it shall be binding and valid on all persons concerned notwithstanding any error or defect in regard to said roll. —Carried.

The court then adjourned sine die.
