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Markham Council.

Markham Township Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Monday, the 29th ult. Members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Communications were received from D. K. Beaton, clerk of Pickering, re. grants on town line; from J. C. Lundy, clerk of Whitechurch, re. grants on town line.

Petitions presented—By Mr. Scott, from G. McKay and 28 others asking grant to improve road opposite lot 29 in the 6th Con.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Slater, moved that the treasurer pay D. Lynett \$12 for 1000 ft. of plank.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the treasurer pay Jno. Hickson \$5 for damages to grain, &c., in drawing out gravel from C. P. Reade's pit; any further damage in the opinion of the council should be paid by the owner of the pit.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the treasurer pay Edward Leathers, on order of the reeve, \$9.80 for repairing 2 culverts on side line between lots 20 and 21, Con 8, as certified by W. D. Reesor, overseer.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the treasurer pay N. J. Clark \$8, for damages sustained in drawing gravel over his place from township pit; also \$3.50 to D. Horner, for right of way across his place.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the treasurer pay E. Hastings, overseer, No. 49, \$2.10 for 14 ft cedar at 8 cents, and 800 ft of plank (hemlock) \$8.50.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that the treasurer pay Jacob Hopper \$3.50, for 290 ft of lumber furnished this municipality.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the treasurer pay Jno. Miller \$8, being 3/4 the amount of damages to sheep killed by dog or dogs, owner unknown as testified on oath.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that the treasurer pay the following accounts—J. Wise, digging ditch on Con 3, lot 19, 84 rods at 1 1/2 cents per rod, \$1.26; and repairing culvert 50 cts., payable on order of J. Clark, R. O.; A. B. Lehman, 164 ft of plank on town line at \$1.20 per C, \$1.97; Whitechurch having paid a like amount, payable on order of J. Bell and C. Wideman, R. O's.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the treasurer pay Henry Hopper \$74.11 out of Elgin Road grant for putting 140 yards of gravel, conditions of grant having been complied with and work satisfactorily done.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the clerk procure a steel road plane and have the same delivered at Mr. J. Cook's, lot 19, Con 3.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the treasurer pay B. B. Reesor on order of P. K. Reesor, \$2.31, being half amount for repairing bridge on town line between Markham and Scarborough; also \$5 to J. Ramer for repairing culvert on south town line in 1890, Scarborough having paid a like amount.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the treasurer pay W. Wetheral \$3, for cedar for repairing culvert, as certified by Sinclair Hagerman, R. O.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the treasurer pay Wilber Leek \$70 for 200 yards of gravel on side line between lots 10 and 11, Con 4, amount payable on order of the mover when the work is completed.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Slater, moved that the treasurer pay Thos. Lyon, on order of Mr. Pingle, R. O., \$3, for repairing culvert in road division No. 37; also W. Weatheral \$2.20, for 2 pieces of cedar 20 ft long.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that the treasurer pay F. Helmckay \$6.50, being cost of repairing culverts on side line between lots 15 and 16, Cons 1 and 2.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that the reeve and mover be commissioners to examine and repair, if required, the following culverts on side line Lots 5 and 6, Concessions 8 and 9; culverts on side line Lots 10 and 11, Con 9; ditching on 10 Concession opposite Lot 12 and bridge on 7th Concession opposite Lot 8, sums required, payable on order of commissioners when work is completed.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the reeve and mover be commissioners to examine, and if required, repair the following: culvert on side line Lots 15 and 16, Con 9; bridge ditch on 9th Con opposite Lot 18; and bridge on side line Lots 15 and 16, Con 7, sums required payable on order of commissioners when work is completed.

Mr. Scott, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that the Treasurer pay Wm. Joyce \$1.50 for cedar used in repairing culvert in road division No. 28.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Schmidt, moved that the Treasurer pay J. Penrose \$6.75 for grading town line between Markham and Scarborough at foot of 8th

Con being half amount for work specified payable on order of the mover when work is completed.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that a further sum of \$20 be granted on Con 6 between Lots 15 and 16, for grading. Mr. Scott and W. Pingle be commissioners to expend the sum payable on their order when work is completed.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that S. Miller and the mover be commissioners to examine and improve, if advisable, side line between lots 10 and 11, Con 6, amount required payable on their order when the work is completed.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Slater, moved that Mr. Scott and Mr. McKay be hereby appointed commissioners to grade road in Con 5, lot 29, and not to exceed \$20, payable on their order when the work is completed.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that Mr. Slater be a commissioner to examine and repair, if necessary, water-courses at lot 20, Con 3, amount required payable on order of the commissioner when the work is completed.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that when this council adjourns it stands adjourned to meet on Saturday, the 15th of August next.

Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Reesor, moved that Mr. Slater be a commissioner to effect a settlement, if possible, with Mr. Kirk re damages sustained to his horse on side line between lots 10 and 11 in 2nd Con, amount required payable on his order.

Mr. Slater, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that \$75 be appropriated to gravel the north town line opposite Con 8, Whitechurch council having appropriated a like amount, and that the reeve, A. Forester, be a commissioner to expend the same in conjunction with the commissioner from Whitechurch, and payable when the work is completed.

Mr. Reesor, seconded by Mr. Scott, moved that \$110 be granted to gravel town line between Markham and Pickering, a like amount having been granted by Pickering, and that the reeve and mover be commissioners to act with commissioners from Pickering to superintend the work, payable on order of the commissioners when the work is completed.

On motion the council adjourned.

Then came the lacrosse match. There was just two entries for the prize, the Canadians, of Toronto, and the Maple Leafs, of Aurora. The Canadians won the first game after a hot contest of 20 minutes. Then after 18 minutes of hard work Malcolmson scored for the Maple Leafs. Again the ball was faced and passed quickly down the centre to Lennox, who sent it flying through the flags of the Canadians, thus scoring for the home team in less than two minutes.

Yet two more goals were made by Lennox and Cherry in about 6 and 8 minutes respectively, thus leaving the score 4 to 1 in favor of Aurora, not 3 to 1 as reported in some newspapers. The Canadians are champions of the Toronto Junior League, and this is the first defeat for them this season.
