THE RECORDER'S TROUBLES.

The Recorder, of Deer Park, is pounding away, hammer and tongs like, at the York County Council for refusing to give another company the privilege of running a railway along Yonge St. It aims at blaming Messrs. Pugsley, Russell and Forster for influencing other members of the Council, but by this it only pays those gentlemen a compliment, because it certainly would be an honor to be able to draw to one's side such an intelligent class of men as the representatives of the various municipalities in the county are. Last week besides its editorial comments there are several anonymous communications from different sections purporting to represent the views of the residents of those places. One under the heading of Thornhill reads as follows:—

"It is reported here that a movement is now on foot in the Township of York to give free right of way to the York Township electric railway over private property, and that it is proposed the line should end at Newton Brook. People here are furious at the way Mr. Forster and Russell have acted, and very severe remarks are made about Mr. Pugsley also."

The above is only bombast, and such remarks about gentlemen in responsible positions should not be inserted in a public journal, unless over the signature of the writer.

Another article under the heading of Richmond Hill reads:—

"The action of the County Council in preventing competition among street railways on Yonge St., is creating much discussion here, and the course of Warden Pugsley is most unfavorably criticised. The opinion generally expressed is that encouragement should have been held out to a company proposing to provide a freight service which would send up the value of every farm north of Hogg's Hollow. The conduct in this matter of the Reeves of Vaughan and Markham comes in for some pretty hard remarks. The people recall the fact that only about three years ago the village was willing to pay for the building of a railway to connect with the Northern, and cannot see why our reeve should have done anything to hinder our getting a much more efficient service by an electric railway down Yonge St."

Such anonymous scribbling is unworthy of our contemporary. We believe the statement that "the course of Warden Pugsley is most unfavorably criticised," is false. We have yet to learn of a single person here who charges Reeve Pugsley with doing "anything to hinder our getting a much more efficient service by an electric railway down Yonge St." We venture to say that the Recorder with all its wisdom in reference to electricity, steam or gas (principally the latter), cannot name one man with any standing in Richmond Hill who will father the above communication, or who is prepared to censure our reeve for the course he has taken with the so-called York County Company. Until it can do so it should cease to insist on offering advice to a people who are in a position any day to look down upon the little hamlet of Deer Park and its would-be advisers on the cut-skirts of the city.

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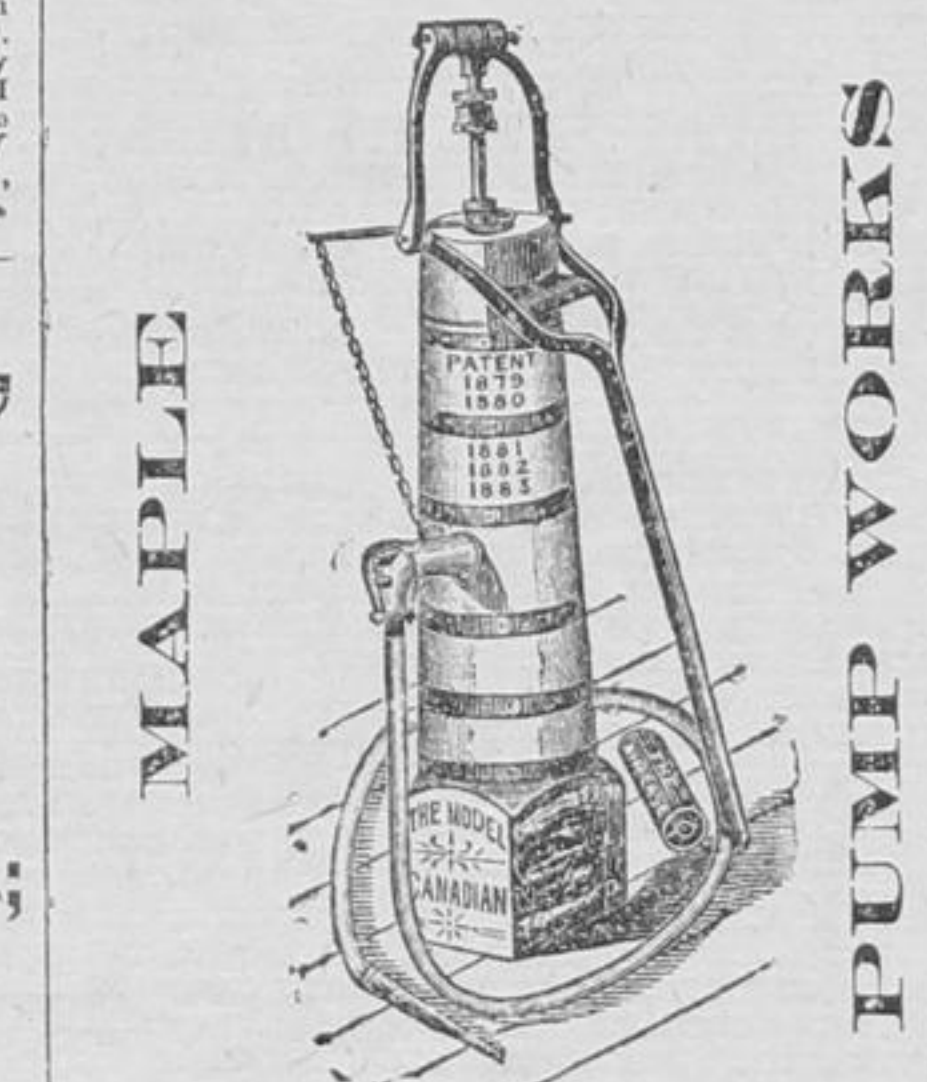
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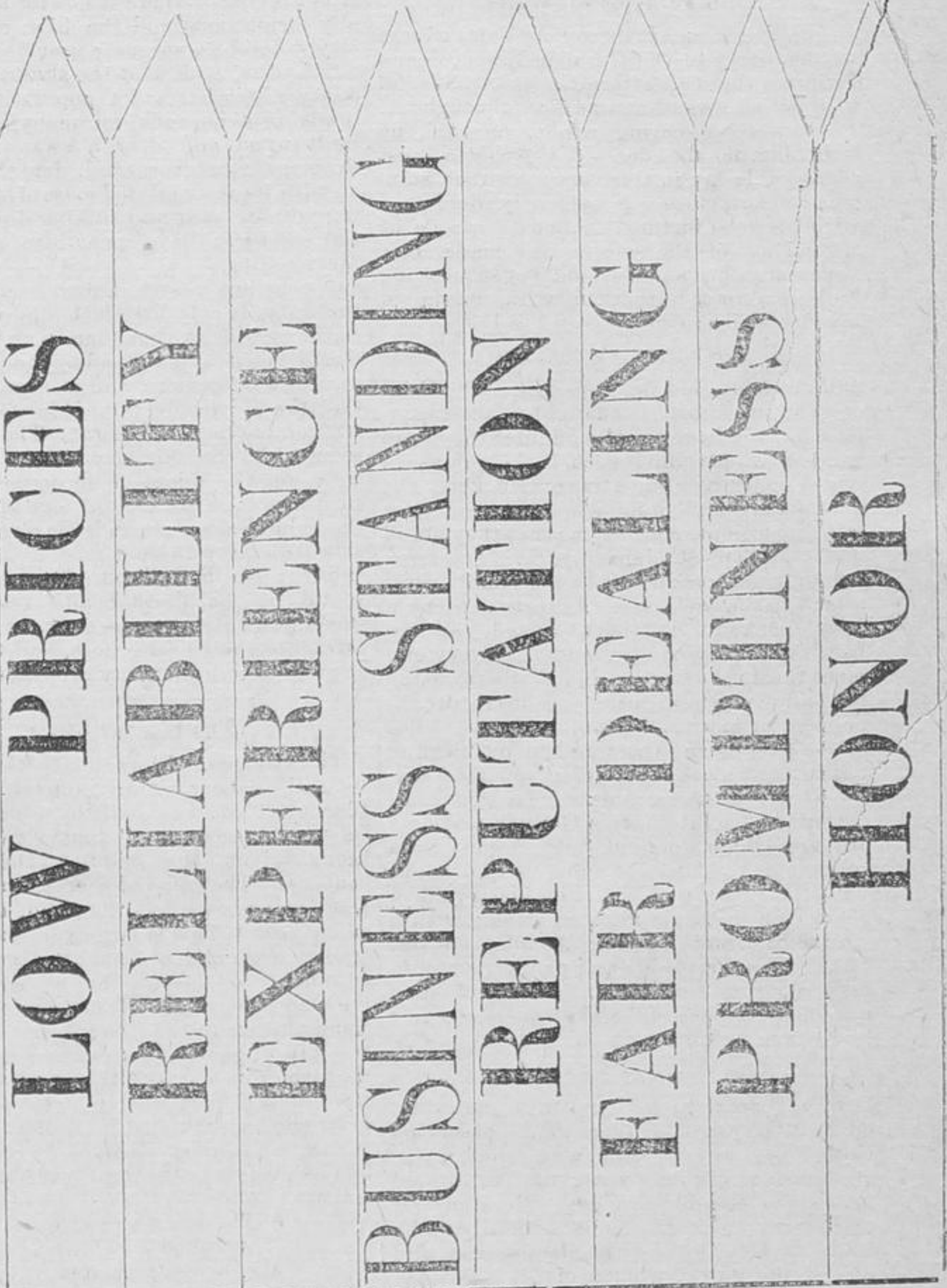
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
