Sudden Death.

Mr. Joseph Perkins, school teacher, Victoria Square, died suddenly on Thursday morning of last week. In company with his wife and one or two others he was in the school house making preparations for the reopening of the school on the following Monday. Without giving or apparently receiving any summons of death he fell to the floor and expired in a few seconds. Heart trouble is said to have been the cause of his sudden death. Although deceased was not of a robust constitution he was generally able to attend to his duties, and his untimely end in the prime of life has caused a great shock to that section. Mr. Perkins had taught in the Victoria Square school for the past fifteen or sixteen years and was always considered a painstaking and successful teacher. For about twenty years he was organist and choir leader in the Methodist church. As a business man he had few superiors, and his death is universally regretted from one end of the section to the other.
