In fact during the past week many Americans were heard giving the highest praise to the exhibition now in progress, and paying compliments to the directors and managers for their success in providing for their patrons such an excellent programme. Every department is well filled, and every province in the Dominion has its particular display. The stock, the machinery, the fine arts, all are good, and greedy is he who complains that he does not receive value for his 25 cents. The fireworks and illumination are cause for wonder, and the "Siege of Paris" is a spectacle never to be forgotten. Toronto is to be congratulated on having such a drawing card, as no better advertisement is wanted for a great city. Considering its many attractions it is not surprising that thousands of people from all parts of the country visit the Toronto Exhibition every year.

SAFE TO HOLD ALOOF.

If N. Clarke Wallace assisted his brother to purchase land privately from the Dominion Government he did wrong.

It matters not that the member for West York is able to persuade himself that the nation received value for the property it sold. The path of absolute non-intercourse in matters of this kind is the path of safety. When Mr. Wallace became a member of Parliament he assumed along with the privileges of his position, an obligation to put away the chances of gain in dealings with the Government that are open to private citizens.

It is not well that men should have the honour of public places and the profits of private citizens doing business with the Government. He should either hold aloof from this profitable line of trade, or he should resign his seat and chase dollars like an ordinary citizen.

There is altogether too much of this John Y. Reid business in civic, provincial and Dominion politics. Perhaps in this land deal Mr. Wallace's brother was not his John Y. Reid. The transaction may have been quite legitimate, but it would have been well for the member's own sake if he could have persuaded his worthy relative not to accept favours from the Government.

Of course it is a small matter. Small matters soon accustom us to sin in public places. It is nothing remarkable now for a representative of the rate-payers to have a moral interest in contracts that are held in other names. If the brother of the member for west York is to get in on the ground floor in a deal with the Government, other statesmen, less honourable will urge all their relatives into the business.

The safe way and the right way is for members of Parliament to stand aloof and see to it that their relatives only obtain such advantages as they can win in open competition with all comers.—*Telegram.*

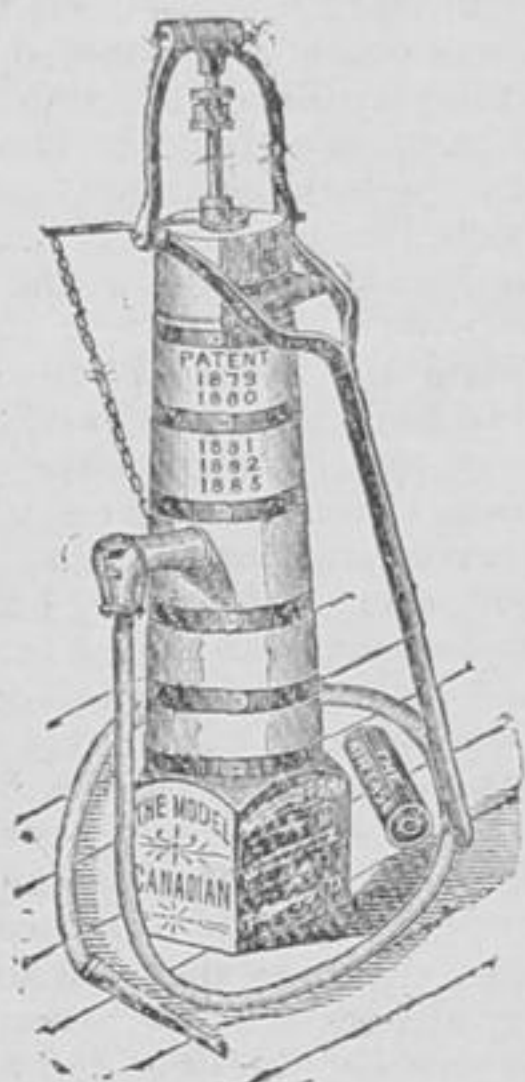
