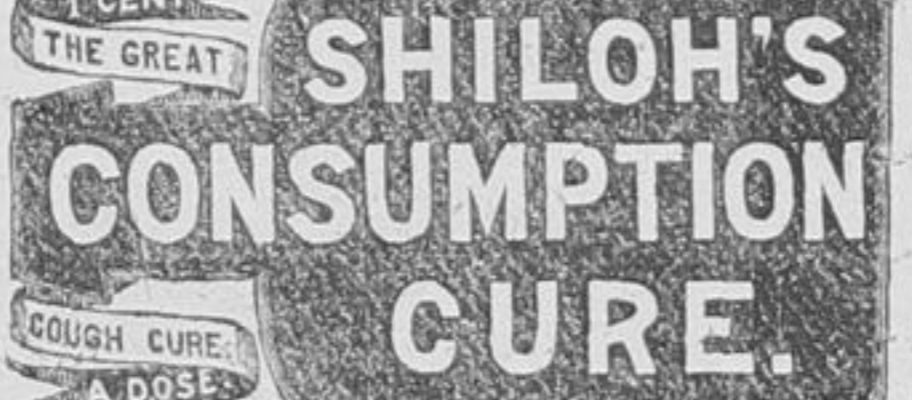
Sabbath School Anniversary.
