It would be impossible to exaggerate in description the majesty and dignity of this scene, notwithstanding one's assurance of

Alone and hopeless of aid, he turned his face toward the glowing east and the holy cities, and, his last act a prayer, his last word a declaration of his unswerving belief, he looked out upon the thousands assembled to witness his end with the untroubled assurance of his fatalistic creed.

And so, as the scant rays of the morning illumed the rude machinery of death, he was swung into eternity, solemnly pronouncing as the cord tightened around his neck "La illaha illalah !"-there is no God but Allah-and died.
