"Young Canadians."

A newspaper published in Washington territory gives an interesting account of a lacrosse match played between the Spokane team and a team composed of Canadians, the latter being victorious by a score of 4 games to 3. We are glad to notice that the Pogue brothers—Wm. and Thomas—took a prominent part in the play for the Canadian team, the former playing 3rd home field, the latter centre. The following is taken from the account of the match:—"The Canadian team played well throughout, all the players distinguishing themselves by their fine team work and skilful dodging. The home completely paralyzed the strong defense of the Spokaneites. Tom Pogue played his errorless game as usual, scoring three of the four goals for his side."

Foot-Ball Match.

An interesting and well contested foot-ball match was played in the park on Saturday afternoon between Victoria Square and the home team. After playing one hour the match resulted in a draw, each side during that time having secured a goal. Although the play was by no means slow, it was void of roughness, and the best of feeling was shown throughout. This was as it should be, and was, no doubt, owing to a considerable extent, to the fairness and good judgment of the referee, Mr. E. J. Hitchcock, and to the good sense of the spectators who did not in any way interfere with the game, except to express approval when good play was made. During the first half time, the play seemed to be as even as possible most of the time, although the home team faced the sun, the wind and the incline of the field. In the second half time the players reversed ends, when the play was also pretty even, although the ball was three-fourths of the time past the centre of the field, nearer the visitors' flags. On the whole the Vics showed better team play, whereas, individual play on the home team was superior. After the match cheers were given for each side and the referee, after which the visitors were dined by the Hill boys, at the Dominion hotel. The following are the players who composed the teams:—
