County Council.

The above Council met in the Court  
House, Toronto, on Monday of last week,  
all the reeves and deputy-reeves being in  
their places with the exception of two.

The first business was the reading of a  
number of communications which had been  
received by the clerk during the  
past three months.

A number of applications for the  
position of keeper of the Industrial  
Home, together with petitions of rate-  
payers in support of them were presented.

On the suggestion of the Committee on  
County Property the Council gave the  
Toronto and Mimico electric railway a  
year's extension of time for the comple-  
tion of the tracks.

The report of the committee appointed  
to arrange the sharing of the costs of ad-  
ministering justice in the County of York  
and Toronto Junction was presented by  
Councillor Evans. It stated that a simi-  
lar committee from Toronto Junction had  
agreed with the county committee that  
the present arrangement should be con-  
tinued for two years longer. Thus the  
town agrees to pay the county \$1,000 a  
year for administering justice and \$25 a  
year to aid in maintaining the county  
registry office. This agreement met the  
view of the council and the report was  
adopted.

The Board of Auditors reported that  
they had refused to pass the accounts  
presented by several constables because  
they thought the county should not be  
held responsible for these charges.

The discussion regarding the deviation  
of the Metropolitan Street Railway tracks  
at Bedford Park was resumed when the  
committee had gone into committee of  
the whole, Mr. W. P. Ellis, in front of  
whose store the track swings out into the  
highway: C. D. Warren, president of the  
Metropolitan Railway; and County En-  
gineer McDougall were heard by the  
committee. It was finally decided to ask  
the railway to move the track two feet  
farther out so as to allow rigs to stop in  
front of Bedford Park post office.

A motion was carried to petition the  
Legislature asking that provisions be  
made whereby parties asking to have  
their names put on the Voters' Lists, or  
appealing against assessment, should first  
apply to the Municipal Councils, and  
that the costs of such appeals should fol-  
low the rules of courts of law.

A session was almost entirely devoted  
to the hearing in committee of the whole  
of the statement of the late keeper of the  
County Industrial Home, Jerrard Irwin,  
Inspector of anatomy Millard and Mr.  
Wilson, ex-reeve of York, regarding the  
charges and complaints against the man-  
agement of the said home. The investi-  
gation was principally confined to the  
charges regarding the disposal of the  
bodies of several of the inmates after  
death. After a lengthy examination of  
the witnesses and a prolonged discussion  
it was moved and carried that the blanks  
in the amended by-law, appointing a  
keeper and matron of the Industrial  
Home, be filled by the names James  
Kavanagh and Maria Kavanagh. The  
committee rose and reported. The by-  
law was read a third time and passed.

Notice of motion was given by Mr.  
Ross, that tollgate No. 3, Yonge street,  
be moved as far north as lot No. 83, and  
that the Council cease to collect toll at  
gate No. 4, Yonge street.

Notice of motion was given by ex-  
Warden Pugsley: "That the time has  
come when it is desirable that the county  
be separated from the city of Toronto for  
judicial, as well as municipal, purposes.  
The advisability of transferring the  
Lake Shore road to the city of Toronto  
was discussed at length by the council in  
committee of the whole.

Mr. Evans moved that a by-law should  
be framed transferring the Lake Shore  
road to the city on condition that the  
road be widened and kept in good repair,  
preserving all existing rights and con-  
ditions.

The warden moved another amendment  
which was carried, that a committee con-  
sisting of Messrs. Evans, Richardson,  
Humberstone, Stokes, Lundy, Russell  
and the warden be appointed to confer  
and make arrangements with the city re-  
garding the handing over of the road,  
and to report to the council next January  
for approval.

Mr. Scott, of Markham, moved that  
the Local Legislature be petitioned to  
amend the Municipal Act in such a way  
that municipal councils, with the approval  
of the ratepayers, be empowered to es-  
tablish a system of municipal fire insur-  
ance. The resolution was adopted and  
the committee rose and reported.

Ex-Warden Pugsley gave notice of  
motion, seconded by Mr. Stokes, "that  
the Committee on By-laws and Legisla-  
tion be instructed to introduce a by-law  
this session to authorize an agreement to  
be made between the County of York  
and the Metropolitan Street Railway  
Company, giving the said company a  
perpetual franchise to build and operate  
an electric railway from the northern  
limit of Toronto to the village of Rich-

mond Hill on Yonge street, the said  
franchise being conditional upon the  
company completing and operating said  
railway within one year from January 1,  
1893, and such other conditions as may  
be set forth in said agreement."

The resolution was afterwards amended  
as follows: "That an agreement be en-  
tered into with any electric railway com-  
pany for an exclusive franchise for 99  
years, subject to the approval of the  
council and the Ontario Legislature."

The motion was carried.  
A pleasant time was spent at the war-  
den's supper held at the Clyde hotel on  
Friday evening, and the council adjourned  
on Saturday.
