THE WORLD AFTER COSGROVE.

A meeting held on Wednesday night of last week in the east end of the city favoring Political Union with the United States is causing a good deal of talk in political circles. The following is the manifesto which was submitted to the meeting:

"Continental Political Union Association, Ward No. 1, Toronto.—We, the undersigned, hereby enroll ourselves members of the above association, and we agree to promote by all lawful and honorable means the political union of Canada and the United States upon terms honorable and advantageous to both countries."

The World newspaper, a day or two afterwards, published the names of those who were said to have signed the document, and among others gave the name of Mr. J. J. Cosgrove, Deputy Collector of Inland Revenue. Mr. Cosgrove, in The Empire, denied having signed such a paper, saying he is not in favor of annexation. Notwithstanding this denial The World maintains that the signature is genuine, and Mr. E. A. Macdonald, the originator of the movement, now threatens to proceed against Cosgrove for criminal libel, as he considers that the denial is equal to a charge of forgery and falsehood on his part. The World may be a little more interested in endeavoring to expose Cosgrove from the fact that the latter worked against Mr. W. F. Maclean during the recent election campaign in East York. If it can be proven that the Inland Revenue officer signed the manifesto referred to, it may endanger his position. The following is the oath subscribed to by all Civil Service employees when they take office:—

"I, do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria as lawful sovereign of Great Britain and Ireland and of this Dominion of Canada, dependent on and belonging to the said Kingdom, and I will defend her to the utmost of my power against all traitorous conspiracies or attempts whatsoever which shall be made against her person, crown and dignity, and that I will do my utmost endeavor to disclose and make known to Her Majesty all treasons or traitorous conspiracies and attempts which I shall know to be against her: and all this do swear without any equivocation, mental evasion or secret reservation. So help me God!"

Mr. W. A. Bell, at the meeting of the Young Liberal-Conservatives on Monday evening, gave notice of the following motion:—"That whereas it is reported that Sir John Abbott has tendered his resignation as premier of this Dominion to his Excellency the Governor-General; that it has pleased his Excellency to accept the same and to call upon Sir John Thompson to form a Cabinet; that that gentleman has accepted the task, and is now engaged in carrying it out; be it resolved that the Young Men's Liberal-Conservative Association view with alarm the selection of Sir John Thompson, believing that it will tend to the disintegration and the ultimate dissolution of the Conservative party of Canada."

When, a week or two ago, a prominent member of the Young Men's Conservative Association made the remark in one of their meetings that there were more Can-

adians in the city of Chicago than there were in Toronto, some of his brother members challenged the truth of the statement. We are not prepared to say whether the young politician was within the mark or not, but by figures obtained through the census department at Washington he could not have been far astray. The report shows that in the year 1890 there were nearly a million Canadians in the Republic, the exact number being 980,941 as compared with 717,157 in 1880, an increase of 263,784, or about 37 per cent. The number of Canadians in the New England States in 1890 was 380,267 as against 175,426 in 1880, showing that in ten years the number has considerably more than doubled.

At the Imperial Federation meeting at the auditorium on Tuesday evening Mr. Dalton McCarthy, in proposing a vote of thanks to Mr. Parkin for his very eloquent and interesting address, expressed his warm approval of Sir Oliver Mowat's action in regard to the dismissal of Mr. Elgin Myers, and remarked that, though by his action in that matter Sir Oliver might have lost a supporter in Mr. Myers, he had found another in Dalton McCarthy. Referring to the recent elections in the United States, Mr. McCarthy said it was evident that the McKinley tariff had received its death blow, and it was now time for Canada to do something.

Smith Bros are busily engaged at Mr. Reaman's house at Carville.

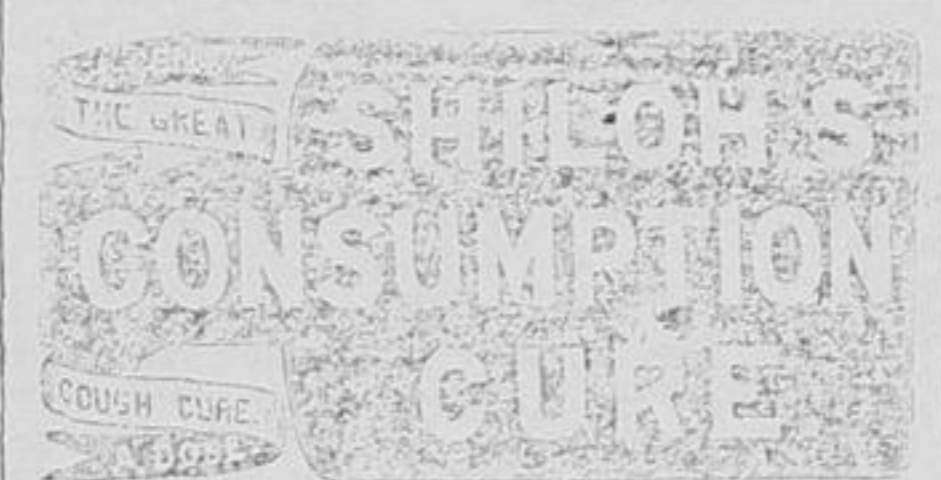
Mr. Wice, of Weston has rented the farm now occupied by Mr. Richbell.

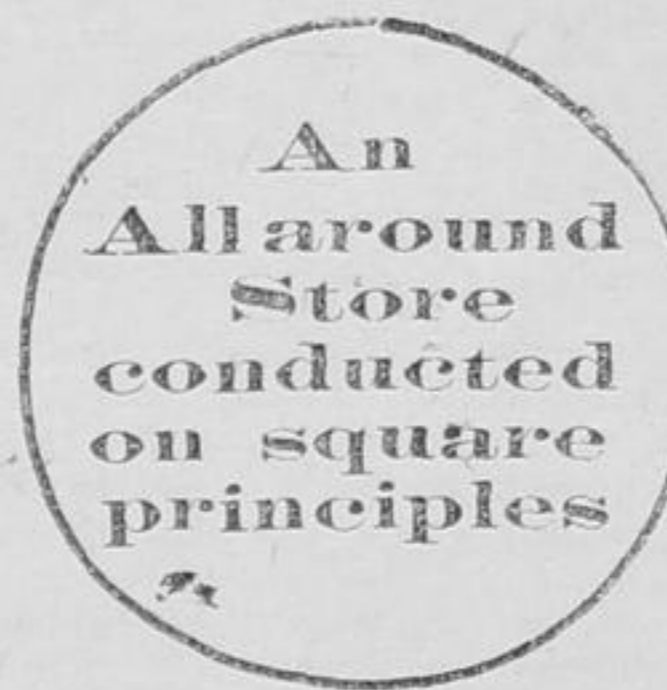
