An attempt to raise subscriptions for nearly that amount failed and the company suspended foster faction. payments. The French Government appointed administrators and confidence was renewed to such an extent that large sums were raised by subscription. In December, 1890, an arrangement was effected with the Columbian Government, by parties interested in the canal, in accordance with which the time allowed for its completion was extended for a further period of ten years, on the understanding that a new company should be formed to take over the entire assets of the old one and that the work of construction should be actively resumed before February 28, 1893. Now it is estimated by the suspiciously optimated official receiver that the work can be completed for \$36,000,000-a sum probably too low by half, yet so small in comparison with the amount already expended that it is hardly given up and the money already sunk al-


