**INDIAN MISSION WORK.**

We are pleased to know that the members of the Women's Auxiliary in connection with the Church of England, in this village, are at present, and have been for some time past, busy in carrying out the plans of the association. They have this week, through Mrs. Falconbridge and Miss Holmes, forwarded to the destitute Indians two large bales of goods consisting of men's, boys', women's and children's clothing, together with a few groceries. It must be observed that all the contributions have not been confined to members of the church of England but have been augmented by members of other churches—men and women. The next package will be forwarded to its destination, about the 10th of January, by Mrs. Pugsley and Miss Sterling, by whom contributions will be thankfully received.
