According to the Empire it is almost a crime for a man to think for himself. Because Mr. Dalton McCarthy has expressed himself in favor of Tariff Reform that journal anticipates that the member for North Simcoe intends repudiating the National Policy, and therefore it loses no opportunity in belittling him in all he says and does. For many years Mr. McCarthy has been looked upon as one of the strongest and cleverest men in the Conservative party, and has often been spoken of as a likely successor to Mr. Meredith as leader of the opposition in the Ontario Parliament. Mr. McCarthy, it appears, has been consulting his electors on public questions, and this also has been thought sufficient for another attack by the Empire. It certainly would be more in the line of party heelers to have consulted the party before consulting his constituents, but this Mr. McCarthy did not choose to do. It is said that a meeting of the North Simcoe Conservatives will be held shortly, when the member for that riding will explain his views not only on the tariff but on other questions. In all probability he will enter the field as an Independent at the next election.

Among the many useful bulletins issued by the Ontario Government and distributed throughout the province, is a special number just to hand, in reference to the teaching of Agriculture in the Public Schools. It was delivered by Mr. C.C. James, M. A., Deputy Minister of Agriculture, before the Provincial School Trustee Association, and by their request published by the Department of Agriculture. The very important subject is discussed under three heads as follows: 1st—Should Agriculture be taught in our Public Schools? 2nd—Can it be taught? and 3rd, How can it be taught? Teachers, farmers or other parties can obtain a free copy of the pamphlet by applying to the Department.
