Miss Alexander has been forbidden by her physician to perform for three weeks or a month, therefore her recital in Thornhill has been postponed indefinitely.

### The Lake Magazine.

The Jan'y number of the Lake Magazine which has just been issued, is undoubtedly one of the best ever presented to the public. From beginning to end it is full of matter which is not only interesting and amusing, but instructive as well. A well written article on Mexico, with accompanying illustrations, occupies the first pages; then comes a stirring article on Woman Suffrage, from the well-known pen of Katherine McKenzie; a political article by Kapp, dealing in a masterly way with the question of the day, Canada and Imperial Federation, and a number of short poems, stories and sketches, chief among which is "The Girl in Canada," by Stuart Livingston, and "A North-West Sketch" by Marguerite Evans, completes the contents.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a Fraternal Benevolent Society, incorporated in 1879 and registered under the Insurance Corporations Act 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the Society are to furnish its members with Sick and Funeral Benefits and an Insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payments for these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member and the amount of the insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the Society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the Insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada Bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Dominion. In addition to this, the local Courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the Sick and Funeral Benefits. The High Secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a Court of this popular and purely Canadian Society will shortly be organized here.—(Adv.)

### Carrville.

A few weeks ago the trustees of Carrville Public School had notices printed offering a reward for the apprehension and conviction of any person found breaking into the school house of that place. When Mr. John Mellish, caretaker, went to light the fire on Thursday morning of last week he found that some one had been in the school house. Suspecting it had been a tramp he tracked the person for some distance, went to Mr. D. S. Beaman's and got a horse and rig, and with Mr. Beaman's hired man started in pursuit of the offender. They overtook him at Mr. John Page's, and took him to Maple where he was tried before J. C. McQuarrie, Esq., J. P. He was reprimanded and allowed to go, after vowing never again to enter a school house in the vicinity. The reward was paid to Mr. Mellish.

### The Lemon Trophy.

Two rinks of the curling club went to the city on Tuesday, and competed for a pair of curling stones donated by Mr. Henry Lemon, the popular proprietor of the Clyde hotel. The clubs competing were Markham, Scarboro', Scarboro' Maple Leaf, York, Aurora, Richmond Hill, Swansea and Little York. The Hill team won from Aurora in the forenoon, but were defeated by Swansea in the afternoon. Richmond Hill and the Maple Leafs protested against Swansea, as it was claimed that the players reside in Toronto, and the clubs eligible were to be outside the city. Mr. Lemon and Mr. Malcolm, the convener, adjudicated upon the protest and Swansea was thrown out. The final for the stones will be played next Monday at 10 a. m., in Toronto, between Scarboro' Maple Leafs and Richmond Hill.

### Taken over the Don.

An information by his wife was sworn out on Saturday against John Campbell, who for some time past had been living a short distance below this village. J. M. Lawrence, Esq., J. P. issued a warrant for his arrest, and on Monday morning, before Messrs. Lawrence and Reeve Pugsley, he was tried and committed to the county jail as a dangerous lunatic. It appears that this unfortunate man has not been of sound mind for some time, and he was an inmate of the asylum about two years ago. On Saturday he became vicious and chased his wife and another party who was staying at the house, away from the place. Constable Brownlee had him in charge on Saturday night and Sunday, and on Monday gave him in charge of the authorities in the jail. He remained in the fire hall on Sunday and Sunday night.

### Willowdale's New School.

The opening ceremonies in connection with the new school house at Willowdale, township of York, took place on Tuesday, the 17th inst. An interesting programme had been arranged, and a large number of people was present to witness the proceedings. The people of Willowdale now have the best school building for many miles around, and the trustees and those who encouraged the work are to be congratulated for the enterprise they showed in the undertaking. The Recorder gives the following description of the new building:—"The school house is solidly built of red brick on stone foundations, and the exterior presents an attractive appearance with its bell-tower 56 ft. high. The edifice has a slate roof, cut stone trimmings, canopied front entrances and gold-lettered tablet in the front gable. It has a cellar seven feet high, and two lofty stories each containing school room, class room and cloak room. The interior finish is principally of hardwood. The heating and ventilation are arranged in the most approved method, a No. 146 "Marvel" coal furnace being used. The frontage of the building is 42 feet and the 56 ft. and its general appearance is creditable alike to the architects, and a source of legitimate pride and satisfaction to the School Trustees and the people of Willowdale. The work has been thoroughly done with first class materials by the contractors named below, under the superintendence of Mr. Wm. R. Gregg, Architect, 61 Victoria St., Toronto:—mason work, Mr. James Woods, Newton Brook; carpenter work, Messrs. L. Innes & Sons, Richmond Hill; painting and glazing, Mr. Geo. Bilson, Willowdale; slating, Messrs. Geo. Dutilleul & Son, Toronto; and furnace work Mr. Chas. Mason, Richmond Hill."

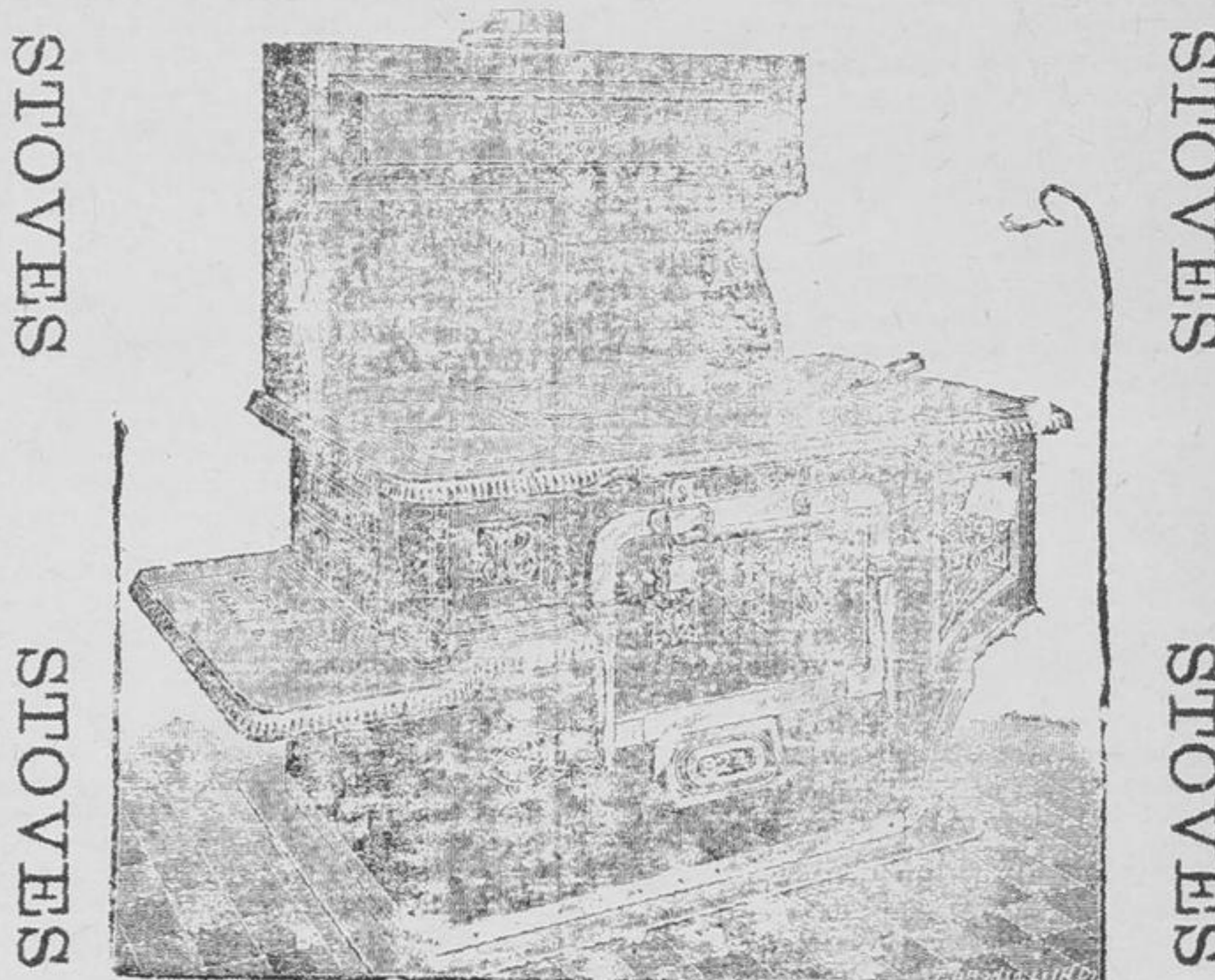
