County Council.

The York County Council opened its
January session on Tuesday, the 24th
ult. All the members were present.
After the election of Warden the mem-
bers proceeded to business. A number
of communications were read.

A short session was held on Wednes-
day, the chief business being the receipt
of the report of the committee appointed
to strike the Standing Committees.

Warden Russell was called away early
Thursday morning, upon receiving news
of his mother's dangerous illness, and
Mr. W. D. Stephenson was appointed
chairman.

Messrs. H. A. Nicholls and T. Ratcliffe
were appointed auditors for the year at
a salary of \$40 each.

On Friday the Council resolved to
petition the Legislature to amend the law
in relation to the revision of the voters'
lists by the County Judge. The proposal
is that failing the appellants pay the
costs.

The Commissioners of County Property
for 1893 will be: Mr. McDonald, reeve of
Georgina; Mr. Baird, deputy reeve of
Scarboro, and Warden Russell, by virtue
of his office.

In the afternoon Warden Russell, Mr.
Brag and Mr. Stokes were appointed as
the county's representatives on the Board
of Directors of the Toronto Industrial
Fair.

The council adjourned on Saturday
until the following Tuesday.

When business was resumed on Tues-
day several communications were laid on
the table. The North York Farmers'
Institute asked for a grant of \$2,500. A
motion was carried to petition the Legis-
lature praying that body to publish in
pamphlet form the several School Acts.

Among the notices of motion given was
one by Mr. D. McDonald, that he would
move that the Dominion Government be
petitioned to grant remuneration to those
who were compelled by law to slaughter
animals affected with infectious diseases;
one by Mr. Reesor, that he would move
that the Committee on By-Laws be in-
structed to petition the Ontario Legis-
lature to amend the Assessment Act so
that owners of farming property should
only be assessed for their proper propor-
tion of the amount they have invested in

the property, and that the mortgagee pay
the same rate of taxation to the municip-
ality in which he has his money invest-
ed; and one by Mr. Yule, that he would
move that the Committee on By-Laws
and Legislation be instructed to prepare
and report to this council a petition to
the Legislature, requesting a change in
the High School Act so that the County
Council and high school trustees may fix
high school fees at a rate higher than \$1
per month.

The council confirmed the Lake Shore
Road agreement.

The Committee on Education reported
on a by-law to appoint high school
trustees, which was read and considered
in committee of the whole. The by-law
was adopted. The following were ap-
pointed trustees: Weston high school,
G. R. Wadsworth; Markham, Jas. Lee;
Richmond Hill, William Trench; New-
market, Geo. Rose; Aurora, Jas. Legge.

Marsh, seconded by Mr. McConaghy.

The following were re-elected as a com-
mittee of management:—J. Boyle, D.
Lynet and F. McConaghy.

The secretary and Dr. Wilson were
also appointed to assist the head master
of the High School in selecting library
books, apparatus, &c., for the school.

A report from Mr. Davidson, Inspector
of Public Schools, was read on his recent
visit to the schools here. The report was
most satisfactory for each department,
and several of the Board expressed them-
selves as being well pleased.

to call the meetings of the Board on the
