RICHMOND HILL HIGH SCHOOL  
 THIRTY-THREE YEARS  
 AGO.

It may be interesting to many of our older inhabitants, as well as others, to read the results of the competitive examinations in what was then called "The Richmond Hill County Grammar School" thirty-three years ago.

We find by the York Herald of the 22nd April, 1859, that our Grammar School was presided over by the late Rev. Samuel Johnson, M. A., Trinity College, Dublin, one of the most brilliant scholars that ever took charge of the school. George P. Dickson, Esquire, was at that time chairman of the Board of Trustees.

The names of successful pupils in 1859 were:

Greek.—1st, Master Falconbridge.  
 Euclid.—1st, Master Falconbridge; Masters McMurchy and McPhillips equal.

Algebra.—Masters Crosby and Falconbridge equal.

English History.—Masters Falconbridge and Malcolm equal; 2nd, Master McPhillips.

History—2nd class.—Master Teety; Misses Dick and Wright equal.

English Grammar.—Masters Dickson, Teety and Foley equal.

Latin.—1st, Master Falconbridge and Master Blake; 2nd, Master McPhillips.

Euclid—2nd class.—1st, Master Playter; 2nd, Master Blake.

Latin—2nd class.—1st, Master Crosby; 2nd, Master Malcolm.

Latin—3rd class.—1st, Master Teety; 2nd, Master Foley.

French.—Masters Falconbridge and McPhillips and Miss Wright equal.

Arithmetic.—Masters Freek and Cook equal; 2nd, Master Teety.

Arithmetic—2nd class.—Master J. Foley and Miss M. A. Lee equal.

It is with pleasure that we find, in after-life, that several of the old pupils of our Grammar School have reflected credit on their *Alma Mater*. The Master Falconbridge above named is now the Hon. William Glenholme Falconbridge, one of the Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice. The Master Dickson is George Dickson, Esquire, Principal and First English Master of Upper Canada College. The Master Teety is now the Rev. J. R. Teety, Superior and President of St. Michael's College, Toronto, affiliated with Toronto University.

Messrs. Falconbridge and Teety are members of the Senate of Toronto University.

Referring to the Speech from the Throne, the Toronto Evening News, a newspaper which is decidedly Conservative in its leanings, says that the speech delivered at the opening of Parliament was an insult to public intelligence. We give the following quotation from that journal of Friday last:—

"The speech from the throne delivered at Ottawa yesterday by the Governor General is as meagre as it is disappointing.

"It is absolutely non-committal. At a time when the minds of men are possessed by a feeling of unrest; when the enemies of the state are working on a manifest spirit of discontent; right on top of the hearty endorsement of D'Alton McCarthy in North Simcoe we have this paltry production with its empty platitudes and insignificant proposals presented to the Dominion House as the

programme for the coming session.

"The contemptuous assumption that the present state of affairs is entirely satisfactory is either the insolence of fancied security or the folly of utter ignorance.

"The Conservative party cannot exist forever on its past record. What the country wants now is action. A clear-headed, vigorous dealing with trade issues and an honest endeavor to improve conditions which have become well nigh intolerable.

"Is it any use to sit down and pour out empty congratulations when the bone and sinew of the country are drifting across the border, and of those left at home a portion are agitating for a transference of Canada bodily to the States?"

Many Conservatives, especially among the farming class, are in their hearts, free-traders. They know that the N. P. prevents them from obtaining as high prices for their products as they would, were tariff walls pulled down. And on the other hand they know that the N. P. is an obstacle in the way of buying cheaper goods in many lines. When asked why they do not support the policy advocated by the Liberals of this country, they say that Conservatives are doing just as much in getting better trade relations as their opponents. Can they show anything done of late years by the Conservative party to support their contention? Does the speech delivered at the opening of Parliament the other day, which contained not one word about the tariff, look as if they were doing what they could for the farmers? On Monday the Hon. Wilfrid Laurier moved an amendment to the address declaring for a reduction of customs taxation. Does it look as if the Conservative members are sincere when they profess to be anxious to relieve the taxpayers when every one of them voted against the amendment? Their actions do not coincide with their words. If they are honest they should admit that they are not yet prepared to declare for a lower tariff.

Is hereby given that application will be made to the Legislature of the Province of Ontario at the next Session thereof by The Metropolitan Street Railway Company of Toronto, for an Act

1. Changing the name of the said Company to "The Metropolitan Railway Company."

2. Declaring the said Company to be a Railway Company within the meaning of and with the powers conferred by the Railway Act.

3. Ratifying and confirming sundry agreements between the Corporation of the County of York and the Company, dated respectively 25th June, 1884, 20th January, 1886, 28th June, 1889, 17th December, 1889, 20th October, 1890, and 2nd March, 1891, also By-Law 592 of the County of York and an agreement which may be entered into between the said Corporation and the said Company before the next Session of the Ontario Legislature.

4. Authorizing the said Company to extend and operate their lines to Lake Simcoe or to any intermediate point between the present terminus and Lake Simcoe, and to build branches from their Railway including the extensions thereof, also to extend, equip, maintain and operate their Railway to the City of Hamilton, with power to purchase or lease right of way for any of the purposes of the said Company.

5. Authorizing the Company to manufacture, sell and supply electricity in the City of Toronto and elsewhere for any purposes for which the same may be utilized to manufacture and sell all electrical material and apparatus, connections and fixtures in connection therewith.

6. Authorizing the said Company to construct or lease, maintain and operate telegraph and telephone lines, cars or boats for passenger or freight traffic, with power to connect or amalgamate with, lease or sell to, or make running or other arrangements with any Railway, Street Railway or Steamboat Companies or Corporations, or to acquire any such Railway, Street Railway Lines or Steamboats.

7. Authorizing the said Company to acquire and hold and sell or mortgage lands, buildings and works for parks or pleasure grounds, or other purposes of the Company.

8. Authorizing the Company to use electricity or other power for the pumping and supplying of water, and to lay down mains and do all such things as may be necessary for such purpose.

9. Authorizing the Company to raise or borrow for the purposes of the Company upon Mortgage Bonds or Debentures to the extent of \$2,000,000 Per mile.

10. Giving to the Company all powers necessary for the carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.
