Although the budget speech, delivered in the House of Commons on Tuesday by the Hon G. E. Foster, is somewhat disappointing after so much agitation relative to a radical change in the tariff, farmers should be thankful even for small favors. The duty is to be reduced on coal oil two cents a gallon, and on binder twine it has been lowered from twenty-five to twelve and a half per cent. During the past few months many very stirring speeches have been made on the two commodities referred to above, so that the Government saw plainly that farmers were determined on immediate redress. It is a pity the same Government did not see fit to cut off at the same time several more of the "mouldering branches" spoken of by the premier at the Board of Trade dinner in Toronto a few weeks ago.

Is hereby given that application will be made to the Legislature of the Province of Ontario at the next Session thereof by The Metropolitan Street Railway Company of Toronto, for an Act

1. Changing the name of the said Company to "The Metropolitan Railway Company."
2. Declaring the said Company to be a Railway Company within the meaning of and with the powers conferred by the Railway Act.
3. Ratifying and confirming sundry agreements between the Corporation of the County of York and the Company, dated respectively 25th June, 1884, 20th January, 1885, 28th June, 1889, 17th December, 1889, 30th October, 1890, 2nd March, 1891, also By-Law 582 of the County of York and an agreement which may be entered into between the said Corporation and the said Company before the next Session of the Ontario Legislature.
4. Authorizing the said Company to extend and operate their lines to Lake Simcoe or to any intermediate point between the present terminus and Lake Simcoe, and to build branches from their Railway including the extensions thereof, also to extend, equip, maintain and operate their Railway to the City of Hamilton, with power to purchase or lease right of way for any of the purposes of the said Company.
5. Authorizing the Company to manufacture, sell and supply electricity in the City of Toronto and elsewhere for any purposes for which the same may be utilized to manufacture and sell electrical material and apparatus, connections and fixtures in connection therewith.
6. Authorizing the said Company to construct or lease, maintain and operate telegraph and telephone lines, cars or boats for passenger or freight traffic, with power to connect or amalgamate with, lease or sell to, or make running or other arrangements with any Railway, Street Railway or Steamboat Companies or Corporations, or to acquire any such Railway, Street Railway Lines or Steamboats.
7. Authorizing the said Company to acquire and hold and sell or mortgage lands, buildings and works for parks or pleasure grounds, or other purposes of the Company.
8. Authorizing the Company to use electricity or other power for the pumping and supplying of water, and to lay down mains and do at such things as may be necessary for such purpose.
9. Authorizing the Company to raise or borrow for the purposes of the Company upon Mortgage Bonds or Debentures to the extent of \$20,000 per mile.
10. Giving to the Company all powers necessary for the carrying out of the purposes aforesaid.
