Dr. Ryerson, Conservative, was elected in Toronto on Tuesday for the Local Legislature, over Dr. Ogden, by a majority of over 500. The result does not indicate a want of confidence in the Mowat Government, as Toronto is decidedly Conservative, besides many voted for Dr. Ryerson merely to support a very weak opposition. Had the present Ontario Government been in danger we believe that many voters would have cast a different ballot on Tuesday.

There is no more unpopular law on the Statutes of Canada to-day than the Dominion Franchise Act. No prominent Conservative ever thinks of defending it, and scores of newspapers friendly to the Government have condemned it time and again as unwieldy, expensive and unjust to the party out of power. On account of its unpopularity it was thought it should be repealed altogether, but it now seems that there will be only slight amendments to it during the present session. The changes proposed by the Secretary of State are in the direction of simplifying the preparation of the voters' lists and supplying less intricate machinery for the addition or striking off of names. It certainly would be more satisfactory to the honest voters to have the lists prepared by resident officials of each municipality. The Provincial voter's lists are prepared on the proper basis, and the sooner the Dominion falls into that line the better for all except party healers and those who do not wish their political opponents to secure any measure of fair play.

A number of meetings are being held in York township protesting against the Council of that municipality passing a by-law granting the Toronto and Richmond Hill Street Railway Company the right of way on certain of its streets. Many of the ratepayers look upon the privileges contained in the by-law under discussion as a monopoly, hence the protests. At an enthusiastic meeting held at Fairbank on Tuesday afternoon the following resolution was carried:

"Moved by H. G. White, seconded by David McComb, That this meeting protests against the agreement made between the council of the Township of York and the Toronto and Richmond Hill Street Railway Company (limited), being confirmed by the council of this township, as they believe such agreement is detrimental to the best interests of the Township of York. And this meeting further protests against a by-law being passed by the said council granting the franchise over a large number of streets to this or any street railway company upon all of which they are not compelled to build within a reasonable and definite time."

The citizens of Richmond Hill are in no way agitated over this question, as they have always had far more confidence in getting railway communication with Toronto, on the line of the Metropolitan.

DISCRIMINATION OF SYNONYMS

(WRITTEN FOR THE LIBERAL.)

Under the general designation admit are comprehended the synonyms (1) allow, grant, concede; (2) acknowledge, confess.

To allow is to admit partially, or with certain explanations or reservations, and as a matter of fairness.

To grant is to admit unreservedly, and as expressive of the grantor's own opinion. We concede when we admit out of courtesy, having it in our power to withhold admission. To acknowledge is openly to admit, because of the strength of the evidence adduced. When the admission is, as it were, extracted from us, and when it tells against ourselves, we are said to confess.

The reader should test the accuracy of the preceding discriminations by the following examples of correct use:—"I allow that the expenditure was high, but then the circumstances were exceptional. I am willing to allow that, so far, there was no mistake. I allow that his manner was somewhat against him. We allowed that we had some ground for complaint in the matter. I allow his account of the case is correct; but listen now to the explanation. Everybody must grant the foolishness of unnecessarily exposing one's self to danger. If you do not grant that two and two make four, I have nothing further to say to you. Granted that what you say is true, then what follows? You cannot grant the premises, and deny the conclusion. I am quite willing to concede the point. Be guarded in the concessions that you make to an opponent. How could you expect me to concede that men are governed solely by selfishness? The storm continued with such fury, that the seamen themselves acknowledged that they had never known a worse.

He acknowledged the very moderate tone in which the measure had been brought forward. This must not be conceded without due qualification. He had made the humiliating confession of having judged uncharitably. He explained and enforced the doctrine of progress, but at the same time confessed that there were considerable difficulties in the way of accepting it. Philanthropic enterprise, directed to heathen wants, is universally acknowledged to make for the best interests of humanity. I am not ashamed to confess that at first I gave my adherence to this fascinating but erroneous view. In many things, the wisest of us are obliged to confess our ignorance. He said: "I hold it incumbent on men of science honestly to confess that direct evidence of mental evolution in animals is, in the present state of science, unattainable."

In addition to this, the local Courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the Sick and Funeral Benefits.
